

Brookdale Alley Gating Scheme

1 Background

1.1 The Failsworth & Hollinwood District Team received a petition from the residents of Brookdale Street, concerning the failure of a named business to close the alley gates, which run at the back of the shops on Oldham Road on to Brookdale Street.

2 Current Position

Our Community Safety team have issued letters previously informing all residents within the location to lock the gates accordingly, however residents failed to comply with this course of action.

A discussion took place with Failsworth West Ward Members following an email received by the Community Safety Officer to the District Coordinator, advising that the current gating order be changed to a Public Space Protection Order.

A Public Space Protection Order is designed to protect public spaces and includes reasonable restrictions and requirements. There are some implications which will require funding e.g. signage, along with a completed consulting exercise with residents and statutory undertaker e.g. Greater Manchester Police

Failsworth and Hollinwood District Partnership

July 2015

Money management, 1st March to 30th June 2015

1. Background

1.1. Oldham CAB delivers debt advice sessions on a weekly basis in the Failsworth and Hollinwood District. These sessions alternate weekly between Failsworth Town Hall and Limehurst Library, complementing CAB sessions funded by Oldham Council that also alternate weekly ensuring weekly provision in both.

2. Performance

- 2.1. For this period we have helped a total of 211 people. This is made up of 119 in Failsworth and 92 in Limehurst. This is a significant increase, particularly in Limehurst, in the number of clients accessing these services.
- 2.2. The amount of debt rescheduled for this 2 month period is £37551. The additional income raised through identifying eligible benefit payments totalled £109430.

3. Further development

We have been told that the activation of the Freephone access to our Adviceline service in libraries is imminent, it may already have been done. This will ensure free access to from Monday to Friday (possible future extension to Evenings and weekends) within their community and fit seamlessly with the face to face service that will be focused on those that require more complex support.

Purpose of Paper

The purpose of this paper is to update the Failsworth and Hollinwood District Executive on Community Safety initiatives including alley gating projects.

Alley gating schemes

Gating Order 44 - Hollins Road/Moorcroft St Completed.

CSS 1066 – Minor St/Norman St/Emily Close/Clifton St; Failed to reach the required 80%; with one objection received.

CSS 1061 – Old Road/Grimshaw Street Completed.

CSS 638 – 27-33 Wesley Street

Consultation commenced.

Gating Order 40– Brookdale Street/Oldham Road

Petition received from local residents regarding the alley gates being constantly left insecure. Despite letters sent to residents/businesses gates are continued to be left insecure. Due to the new legislation all Gating Orders currently in force will automatically become Public Space Protections Orders in October 2017.

However in the interim period, the Council has monitored the closure of alley gates on this particular scheme and are considering replacing the Gating Order with a Public Space Protection Order prior to this date. The terms of these Orders can include persons found to be not locking the gates can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Charge and/or be prosecuted.

Other initiatives

Operation Tuscan – This is still ongoing; dependant on available resources.

Home Watch – The Community Safety Officer in partnership with the Neighbourhood Policing Team are continually encouraging residents to join a Home Watch scheme. Your local Home Watch Meeting is held on the second Thursday of every month at Broadbent Luncheon Club Lord Lane, Failsworth.

Burglary Victims - Security surveys are offered to vulnerable and repeat victims of domestic burglary. Crime Prevention Advice is published on our social media sites and more information can be obtained from the Community Safety Officer.

ASB – A number of Warning Letters have been sent to parents regarding their son and daughters behaviour.

4 youths including a number from the North Manchester area were subject of a restorative justice conference with their parents regarding their behaviour on the precinct.

The police in partnership with other agencies/local businesses continue to invoke a policing plan which covers 4 zones and encompasses certain areas which have been identified as hotspots for anti-social behaviour on Friday and Saturday evenings.. Officers and partner agencies patrol these areas and engage with the youths.

Failsworth Town Hall is still utilised on these evening to assist with the youth provision.

There are a number of complex neighbour disputes currently being dealt with, involving extensive partnership working which require appropriate support and intervention.

See appendix 1 for the Failsworth & Hollinwood youth update

Higher Memorial Park – There are still concerns regarding the number of youths who are congregating in the park. One option to be considered is a Public Space Protection Order (PSPO). This is designed to protect public spaces from persistently anti-social individuals or groups. Can include reasonable restrictions and requirements.

New Psychoactive Substances (Legal Highs) – the Community Safety Officer attended a briefing and training day for local professionals; gaining a better understanding of the affects, looking at drug markets setting up drug alerts.

Domestic Violence Training – Full Day

CSO attended this training - Inputs on domestic violence including honour based violence, female genital mutilation and forced marriages.

Signage for Alley Gates - To purchase a further 50 signs at a cost of \pounds 16.25 each; total £812.50 shared with Chadderton District Executive to reduce costs at \pounds 406.25 each district.

Appendix 1 - Failsworth & Hollinwood youth update Kathryn Bardsley - Youth Development Officer, MADHLO

Youth Forum

The Youth Forum are meeting monthly and are looking to recruit new members as several existing members have moved on or no longer wish to be involved. They are still keen to be actively involved in community events and represent the views of young people in the District. They are also looking to link with school councils in the District

Town Hall provision

Over the last month we have seen numbers drop from over 130 to about 40 young people per Friday night session. Staff plan to organize some outdoor activities, including a barbeque, to attract the members back. Planning has also begun on more structured issue based work with the young people now that relationships have been established. We are also organizing transport for young people who wish to access Mahdlo on other evenings.

Rotary/CMI project (Engage, Develop, Succeed)

This project involved young people from Failsworth and Saddleworth working with Rotary members to develop their skills and achieve a CMI qualification. With the success of the first cohort, OBLG have agreed to fund a second project and we are working directly with Failsworth and Saddleworth Schools in recruiting young people who will benefit from such involvement. The young people will be working on developing a project around isolation of the elderly.

Community provision

Presently supporting Councillors with a view to funding and supporting new youth initiatives in schools and sports clubs. Also visiting existing youth provisions to provide support, information and quality assurance particularly around summer holiday provision.

OPENING OF NEW POLICE POST IN FAILSWORTH TOWN HALL



A new police post has been made available at Failsworth Town Hall thanks to strong partnership working with Oldham Council. Council officers will work closely with the neighbourhood policing team and residents will be able to attend drop-in sessions.

"This is great news for the local community and for the police, as GMP will still provide a vital presence in the area.

"Working with the local authority signifies a new relationship where all those who have a stake in building safer communities work side-by-side in genuine partnership. It allows better sharing of information, it means that local issues can be addressed more effectively and a better service to residents."

PC Lee Cullen, of the Failsworth Neighbourhood Team, said: "This new way forward is already having a positive impact. Since the youth zone was launched earlier this year, we've seen a huge reduction in reports of anti-social behaviour. We've felt so welcome by the district team and there's already a feel-good factor around the place that we are making a difference by working together."

The youth club continues to go from strength to strength we have on average 128 young persons in through the doors of the club and as has been the case of recent weeks there was an excellent atmosphere amongst the group.

Mahdlo have now taken over the running of the Youth Zone from Failsworth Youth services.

Neighbourhood Beat Officer Lee Cullen has been congratulated for his efforts by local councillors.

The knock on effect that this club has had has been tenfold and we know that the Failsworth youth group really appreciate what has been provided for them and in turn treat the club as if it was their own space.

Before the youth club opened we used to have around 150 young people wandering around the streets. I watched each weekend as they would walk from KFC to TESCO to the POLE and back to KFC perhaps stopping under the canopy of ALDI on the way.

This generated a high volume of calls from both the staff at the establishments and from members of the public who were impeded in getting access to the doorways where youths were sheltering. We would average anything from 8 to 12 calls each night sometimes from multiple callers regarding the same incident viewed from different positions.

This gave a distorted view of ASB at Failsworth, the figures on a Monday morning screamed out that it was all out of control at Failsworth when in actual fact the solution was there for all to see.

Pc Cullen states 'I have watched our ASB calls go from double figures each night to nil, yes that's no calls for ASB over either a Friday or Saturday night for the last 4 weeks'.

The change has been phenomenal and we truly hope that everyone can join us in promoting the ethos of the new Youth Zone and together we can give the Youth of Failsworth the voice that they deserve.

Community Engagement

Neighbourhood Beat Officer Lee Cullen as taken classes at Failsworth School as part of their Citizenship curriculum. This comprised of two 1 1/2 hr question and answer sessions covering all aspects of police work but focusing strongly on ASB and its impact at Failsworth. Students had lots of questions for Pc Cullen and many of them have wrote letters to Pc Cullen and the Chief Constable at The Police Headquarters as part of their course work asking about what we are doing to target ASB and the current position at Failsworth,

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To assist with the process and for the students to have physical material for their course workbooks, Pc Cullen replied to all 60 students. Students were presented with a certificate to evidence that they have engaged with us in formulating their work.

Community Engagement Continued

Failsworth Community Engagement Event

A two day community engagement event held on the 27th & 28th May arranged by Failsworth East PCSO Suzanne Hudson proved to be a very productive event. The event was supported by Police Officers and Police Community Support Officers, throughout the two day event Crime Prevention Advise, Bogus Caller Talks & Keeping Safe Talks & Road Safety Advise given. Home Watch advise was also given.

- The mobile police station was parked on Morrisons, Failsworth and Tesco Failsworth Car Parks
- Around 100 members of the public attended and were given general advice, crime prevention advice booklets, road safety advice, purse bells and window alarms.
- Children's colouring in books and word searches given to the young children that visited the mobile station.
- EVAS carried out on the Canal Bank, F/worth Quay details forwarded to CSU.
- Leaflet Drops regarding ASB & Shed breaks carried out in various locations.
- Shirley Holt Home Watch co-ordinator attended the event to provide support.
- A Failsworth Growing ambassador attended to help encourage adults and children into growing plants.

The following delivery note is currently being pushed through doors in the Oldham area. The note states there is a parcel waiting in your name and to ring the number for delivery. You are then asked to pay for the delivery by inputting your card details





E-MAIL SCAM BE AWARE:

Reported by our Home Watcher's – An email has been received that purports to be from Microsoft and looks very genuine, it includes the windows logo and makes mention to X Box. The Email is offering a free update to Windows 10 which you will be asked to trial and then be allowed to keep it. When you click on the link it takes you to another site and asks for your email address. Our HomeWatch member rang Microsoft who said they have no knowledge of such an email, are not offering a trial and advise anyone who receives the email to delete it immediately.

HOLIDAY ADVICE

Hopefully summer is on its way and some of you may be considering taking a break. Here are a few tips to help keep your property safe while you are away.



Before you go – Remember

- The best burglary deterrent is to make the home look occupied.
- Unless a room is obviously a bedroom to people outside the home, don't close your curtains in the daytime
 Ask a trusted friend or neighbour to close them for you when it goes dark. Neighbours can help each other in many ways. They can keep the home looking occupied by maintaining the garden to even parking their car on your driveway.
- Use automatic timer-switches to turn your lights on when it goes dark don't forget bedrooms.
- Cancel any milk or newspaper deliveries.
- Avoid discussing holiday plans in front of strangers.
- Cut the lawn before you go and trim back any plants that burglars could hide behind.
- If there is a chance that mail will pile up on your doorstep whilst you are away, consider the Post Office's 'Keepsafe' service. For a small fee, they can hold back the delivery of mail for up to two months.
- Consider leaving important documents and valuable items with other family members or a bank.
- If you normally leave valuable pedal cycles or similar items in your shed, consider putting them in the house.
- If neighbours keep your keys, advise them not to put your surname, address or even your house number on in case they fall into the wrong hands.
- Make sure that you've locked all outside doors and windows and, if you have a burglar alarm, make sure it is se

Shed Security Alert – Burglars are operating in your area

If your shed is particularly vulnerable, it's time to do something about it! It's not unusual for burglars to use items found in a shed to break into your home.

Sheds: Padlocks

A good quality 'hasp & staple' with a padlock is important on all sheds and side doors to garages.

Sheds: Screw heads

Glue smeared over the heads of screws in the external hinges of shed doors or the side door of a garage may stop a thief from simply unscrewing them.

Alternatively, replace a couple of the screws in external hinges with a special type that cannot be unscrewed (sometimes called 'clutch-head', 'anti-tamper' or 'coffin' screws). Sheds: Windows

When your door is secure, don't forget the windows. Perhaps the most effective way of securing a shed window is to fit internal bars or grilles.

Sheds: Alarms

Battery or mains powered shed alarms are now commonly available in DIY stores. If items within the shed are physically secured, how many thieves would spend time trying to release these items when an alarm is ringing?

Lawn mowers

Lawn Mowers can cease to be attractive to a thief if you paint your postcode and house number across the top with house paint. Use a bicycle lock to secure it to

something inside the shed.

Cvcles

Always lock cycles to something fixed or bulky while in the shed or garage (e.g. the ladders or workbench), and have them post coded. Some cycle dealers provide this service for a small charge. Alternatively contact your local police station for advice. Always keep a record of the make, model and frame number. You can register the details at: www.immobilise.com

Garden tools

Don't leave tools in your garden like spades, ladders, etc., for the burglar to pick up. Ask your neighbours not to either. Burglars don't often carry tools, but simply use items left lying around. **Remember to postcode tools**

If it's impractical to postcode with

Ultraviolet ink because of the wear an item would get through regular use, consider engraving or painting the postcode onto the item.

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Failsworth & Hollinwood District Partnership Regeneration Update

Date: July 2015



1 Key Borough Wide Projects

Old Town Hall

Work to transform the Old Town Hall into a new seven-screen cinema is progressing well. The contractors, Morgan Sindall, have been on-site since the Council handed over the keys in October 2013.

Cabinet approved the award of the second and main stage of the construction contract to Morgan Sindall. The main contract works are proceeding to programme, with completion date remaining spring 2016, with Odeon scheduled to open 2 weeks after completion.

Progress has been made on the 'Parliament Square' public realm art enhancement. Work with an artist is ongoing and the main feature will be the installation of five stone columns with one metre owls perching on top. It is planned that a water feature will be installed and detailed design work is underway.

Officers are working closely with agents for letting the restaurant units. A number of potential operators have expressed interest in the units and some have undertaken site visits and more detailed negotiations with potential operators have commenced.

Oldham Town Centre Leisure Centre

The key dates remain as previously reported with the Leisure Centre due to open this winter. Detailed work is underway to ensure that Oldham Community Leisure Ltd maximise publicity in the run up to opening and maximise the number of people purchasing membership packages.

As previously reported Willmott Dixon have signed the Get Oldham Working Charter in which they commit to achieving a range of employment, training and supply chain targets that will benefit residents and businesses in Oldham and Greater Manchester. The percentage of total project cost spent with local supply chain in Oldham is currently 40% with the percentage of total project costs spent with local supply chain in the wider Greater Manchester area at 70%

Coliseum & Heritage Centre

As reported previously the detailed business plan is being worked on with all parties including The Heritage Lottery Fund and Arts Council. The governance structure has been agreed between the Council and Oldham Coliseum Theatre.

Town Centre Public Realm

The works to improve pavements and roads within the town centre is nearing completion.

Broadway Green/Foxdenton

Redrow Homes have received planning consent for 97 new homes. Work is ongoing with Highways England to agree the detailed design for the junction of Broadway and the new road which will go through the heart of the redevelopment.

Royton Town Centre Retail Development

OMBC is working with private sector development partner Dransfield Properties Ltd to facilitate improvements to the District Town Centre. The former Royton Health Centre and Assembly Hall are now demolished. Planning approval has now been obtained for a new Lidl food store as Phase 1 along with improvements to the existing precinct. Discussions are on-going with the new owners of the precinct (Addington and Tristan Capital) to agree the detail of Phase 2 development.

Failsworth & Hollinwood Projects

Hollinwood Junction

On-going discussions are taking place with National Grid and the Greater Manchester Investment Fund, regarding proposals for the removal of the former redundant gas holder adjacent to the M60 and the commencement of initial site infrastructure.

Formal marketing of Hollinwood Junction, as a premium location/destination for businesses, is to commence in Autumn 2015.

Lancaster Club Site

Cabinet agreed to appoint Bellway Homes as developer partner in March 2015. The proposals include 142 new high quality family homes for private sale. The vast majority of homes are 3 and 4 bed with 108 detached. The development includes the conversion of the listed Lancaster Club into 8 private apartments. It is anticipated that a planning application will be submitted in the autumn, with construction starting in early 2016.

As part of the overall proposals for the area, a Goals! Soccer Centre (8 mini football pitches and a changing/club facility) has planning permission to be built on the site of the old allotments. Construction is due to start in late summer and should take around 16 weeks to complete.

A62 Interventions

The Council are looking at a number of underutilised or vacant properties in and around the A62. The Council have successfully worked with the purchaser of the former Social Security building to assist in bringing this property back into use. A developer has entered into an option with the Audacious Church to bring forward redevelopment of the site

The Council have now successfully concluded negotiations with the owner of the former Weavers Arms with a view to selling the two plots of Council owned land which flank the vacant property. Comprehensive redevelopment of the combined site will then be progressed with the owner.

The Dairy Crest site on Ridgefield Street has now been sold to a developer who wishes to develop a high density apartment scheme on the site, which would front the adjoining canal. As the site was previously used for employment uses, it would be necessary for the owner and future planning applicant to satisfy planning policy in providing a marketing statement or demonstrating that the continued use of the site for employment uses is not viable.

The A62 Business Improvement Grant scheme is underway and being managed directly by the Strategic Regeneration Team. Grants are available for independent businesses along the A62 Failsworth corridor to apply for up to 50% of the capital costs to improve the appearance of their buildings, up to a maximum of \pounds 3,000.

Limehurst Estate

Cabinet agreed to appoint Keepmoat Homes as preferred developer for 135 new homes for sale. A public consultation exercise was held on the estate on 17 March with the proposals well received. A planning application was submitted in July 2015 with a start on site date anticipated for early 2016.

The new homes, to be built on Rowan Tree Road and White Bank Road, include around 20% 2 bed, 70% 3 bed and 10% 4 bed houses.

Housing Units/Wickentree Lane

The Strategic Regeneration Team have commissioned a feasibility exercise which addresses the highways problems around Wickentree Lane and also the desire to ensure that Housing Units has a greater presence onto Manchester Road. A preferred option has now been determined and consultation is ongoing with Housing Units. It is anticipated that a public consultation exercise will be held later this year.

2.2 LTP

2.2.1 Unity Partnership is assisting the Council in developing "Oldham Gateway" proposals along the A62 Corridor. Options under consideration include Parking Lay-bys and central Boulevards.

The detailed design of this work is underway. Following this, the scheme will be prepared for Tendering. As this work is situated along the length of the A62 that is currently the site of British Gas activities, the Boulevarding / Lay-by improvement scheme will progress as soon as the gas main has been replaced.

Update Jan-15: The microasphalt scheme is now complete with some outstanding ironwork resetting that will be ongoing throughout January and February.

Update March 2015: Due to the inclement weather during Jan and Feb, the ironwork resetting programme has been delayed to March and April 2015.

Update July 2015: Works complete.

2.2.2 Tesco, Failsworth

As a result of recent feedback the design was revisited to include extra features. As a consequence of that the scheme would cost more than the available LTP funding in 13/14 so a revised bid was submitted for LTP 14/15 and an extra 53k of funding was secured. Unity is now in the process of refining the design. Construction stage is planned for December 2014.

Update November 2014: Detailed design is now complete so Regeneration and Brookhouse are negotiating the improvements with Tesco. Tesco will need to agree to the improvements as part of their lease agreement. Construction work is scheduled for after the Christmas embargo i.e. mid-January 2015.

Update January 2015: The scheme is currently on hold pending further discussions with Tesco concerning their initial request that the 'through route' is adopted by the council prior to them agreeing to the proposed improvements.

Update March 2015: The scheme is still on hold. The road in its current form / alignment would not meet adoption standards. Significant realignments, installation of new signalised junctions and structural work to the existing canal bridge would be required to make the link to an adoptable standard. An outline cost estimate for the works would be up to £3m.

Update July 2015: Discussions are ongoing with Tesco to secure a resolution to the proposals.

2.2.3 The Traffic Team has been approached by a resident of Wye Avenue, Failsworth for the introduction of double yellow lines within the street to remove the obstructive parking taking place. A briefing note is attached which considers this request and it is recommended that the District Executive advise on how this matter should be progressed.

Update March 2015: The scheme has been advertised and no objections have been received. Arrangements will now be made to have the yellow lines introduced.

Update July 2015 : Scheme now introduced

2.3 Utility works

2.3.1 The most recent quarterly Utilities Co-ordination meeting was held on 6 March 2015 and no planned works were noted for the Failsworth & Hollinwood area at this time.
