Metropolitan Place Refurbishment Project Capital Build

Reason for the decision:

To approve the capital build component of the Metropolitan Place project to move 228 Social Work staff from Southlink Units 7-13 to all 5 floors of Metropolitan Place.

The value of the contract is £248k and relates to the physical build alterations that are required to

make the building fit for purpose for the

proposed move in September and October 2019.

Summary:

In December 2018, CIPB approved a capital project to provide fit for purpose accommodation for 22 services based at Southlink based on a wide-ranging options appraisal to provide the right accommodation for Social Work staff in

Oldham Council.

The preferred option was to move all Social

Work teams based at Southlink to vacant floors at Metropolitan Place a fully owned Council building on Hobson Street in Oldham Town Centre.

The preferred option was approved by CIPB on the 21st December 2018 and this paper relates to the refurbishment costs to make the building fit for purpose for Social Work Practice.

The report seeks approval to place the order for the building works to the market so that the site can be occupied in the proposed timeline of the Autumn.

What are the alternative option(s) to be considered? Please give the reason(s) for recommendation(s):

Six Options were considered as part of the Business Case that was constructed in December 2018 taking into account the needs of Social Work Services. These are included in the list below.

Option A - Do Nothing

Option B - Refurbishment of Southlink Units 7-13 Option C - Relocation of Services to Metropolitan

Place

Option D - Refurbishment of Office Block 1

Southlink

Option E - New Build Scheme for Children's

Services.

Option F - Private Office Block Relocation

This options long list was assessed on functional suitability, time to completion, building availability and cost.

Option C- The move to Metropolitan Place scored highest using weighted criteria and was the preferred option that was approved at CIPB.

Recommendation(s):

The preferred option; Option C is to move Social Work Services to Metropolitan Place and the associated building cost to complete this project component is £248k.

The delegated decision requests that the route to market is approved and the relevant costs for building remediation are approved.

Implications:

What are the financial implications?

The capital cost of the project will be funded from within the overall capital funding allocation. The relocation of services is not expected to lead to significant changes in operating costs, the revenue implications are not considered to be material and will be managed from within existing resources through the Corporate Landlord function. What are the *procurement* implications?

The Councils Procurement Department have worked closely with the project team, to ensure requirements are procured in line with internal CPRs and external legalisation. A tender process has been developed for the building refurbishment works which will include local suppliers to tender for the works. Jay Thind Procurement

Legal Services have noted the contents of the Business Case and will provide legal support in relation to the procurement activities and contracts required to deliver the necessary alterations to the building.

What are the **Human Resources** implications?

Full consultation with the staff and trade unions has taken place to ensure that all parties are fully included and updated in terms of impact on their position.

The implications which have been worked through include logistics of car parking for the staff and understandably new ways of working. Staff and trade unions have been invited to introductory sessions at Metropolitan House to review the facility and questions and concerns have been responded to appropriately. A full Equality and Diversity Impact Assessment (EIA) has not been undertaken as the Project relates to the moving of social work staff from Southlink to DDA compliant premises at Metropolitan Place.

What are the property implications

The asset is currently not being fully occupied and the proposed usage of the building by Children's Services will allow for the asset to be fully utilised. The proposed scheme will provide

a sustainable long term solution to their accommodation needs. (Peter Wood)

Risks:

The risks relating to the project are as follows

Risk- The Project timeline is delayed due to project build over runs relating to workmen completing key tasks later than planned.

Mitigation- The timeline has sufficient flex to address the potential delay of occupancy

Risk- The project is delayed due to logistical move pressures arising from additional equipment that has not been accounted for – Mitigation- Move surveys with teams to be completed in July to avoid potential risks relating to move pressures.

Risk- The project is overspent in relation to its overall budget. Mitigation- The project is currently projecting a £49k underspend across the core areas of spend and is on track to be delivered on budget.
