Reason for the decision:

The purpose of this report is to seek approval to award grant funding for the period 1st April 2019 to 31st March 2020 to the voluntary, community and faith sector as identified at Appendix 1.

Summary:

This proposal supercedes a recommendation, approved on 15th April 2019, to award funding to a number of third sector groups for a period of six months through the Priority Programme Fund, community cohesion and community festival budgets. At that time, options were being explored to reduce funding for this strand of work as part of wider in-year budget saving options for 2019/20.

Since the report was produced, the Oldham Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) has identified the £44k required to bridge the shortfall in funding and this report therefore seeks approval to award funding as per the revised allocations listed at Appendix 1.

Due to the size of the annual grant award, approval to fund Action Together is subject to a separate Cabinet report. On that basis, the proposed allocation

presented at Appendix 1 is for information only.

What are the alternative option(s) to be considered? Please give the reason(s) for recommendation(s):

There are no alternative options to be considered at this stage.

Consultation was undertaken with groups affected by the initial proposals. Once approval has been granted to award the full allocations to the voluntary, community and faith groups listed, confirmation will be provided in writing.

Recommendation(s):

It is recommended that the proposed allocations are awarded in 2019/20 as per Appendix 1.

Implications:

What are the financial implications?

The cost of this proposal is £412,400 (as detailed in appendix 1) of which there is £386,940 in the mainstream budget. The shortfall in the budget is to be met by the CCG.

During Quarter 1 expenditure totals £95,250. The financial risk is that the funding from the CCG, which has not yet been received, is withdrawn leaving the council with an overspend of £25,460 which would need to be met from within the service area. (Carl Holdaway)

APPENDIX 2: BACKGROUND TO THE DECISION

1. Background:

- 1.1 The Council has provided core grant funding to voluntary, community and faith sector organisations through the Priority Programme Fund (PPF) for many years. The allocation of this budget has been reviewed at regular intervals and there are now only a small number of organisations who receive funding as a result of a reduction in the overall budget, changing Council priorities and the need to seek greater efficiencies and value for money.
- 1.2 Grant funding is also allocated as a contribution towards overheads and running costs to organisations which support the Council to deliver community cohesion (CC) related activity. The Stronger Communities Team manage a dedicated budget for community cohesion related activity and along with providing core grant funding, it is used to commission third party support to victims of hate crime, through Stop Hate UK.
- 1.3 The Council also provides a small amount of grant funding as a contribution towards the delivery of annual community festivals which take place in the Borough and meet Council priorities. There is a dedicated Community Festivals (CF) budget for this.
