The Licensing Act 2003 Interested Party Representation Form



The Licensing Act 2003 (the act) makes local authorities responsible for the licensing of pubs, clubs, theatres, cinemas, restaurants, takeaways and so on. Some premises may apply to extend their hours or add some form of regulated entertainment and this is where interested parties can have their say by making relevant representations and objecting to the proposals.

Interested parties

An interested party is defined by the act as:

- An Elected Member
- A person living in the vicinity;
- A body representing persons living in the vicinity;
- · A person involved in business in the vicinity of the premises; or
- A body representing persons involved in such businesses.

The word "vicinity" has not been clearly defined by the act. If you are living or working close enough to a premises and you are to be affected by the activities, we will look at your location to determine if you can be described as 'in the vicinity'.

What are the objectives?

Representations can only be made on the grounds that there may be a breach of the licensing objectives in the act. These are:

- The prevention of crime and disorder; (Examples of representations relevant to this objective are illegal drugs, sex related activities, violent behaviour, anti-social behaviour, drunkenness, drug dealing, underage selling, and so on.)
- Public safety;

(Examples of representations relevant to this objective are breaches of health and safety laws, accommodation limits, first aid, unauthorised alterations to property and so on.)

- The prevention of public nuisance; and (Examples of representations relevant to this objective are noise nuisance, noxious smells, anti-social behaviour, litter in the vicinity and so on.)
- The protection of children from harm. (Examples of representations relevant to this objective are underage selling, sexual activities, access to premises, drugs use and so on.)

What are relevant representations?

"Relevant representations" is the term used in the act for comments including objections on applications, reviews etc.

For the purposes of making a representation by an interested party, a representation must be relevant. For a representation to be relevant it must:

- relate to the effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of the licensing objectives (stated as above);
- be made by an interested party or responsible authority;
- not have been withdrawn;
- not be 'frivolous' or 'vexatious' or, in the case of a review, 'repetitious' if made by an interested party.

Try to be as specific as possible and give examples e.g. on 1 February I could hear loud music from the premises between 10pm and 1 am. I am concerned that if the premises open until 2 am this will cause a public nuisance to me and other residents of the street.			

To prevent crime and disorder	I have serious concerns of an increase in crime and disorder directly linked to installing an access point onto the River side path. My Concerns include intoxicated people now being directed onto Knoll Close, urinating on the path and access steps, breaking bottles on the poorly lit path were children play and people walk their dogs. This will surely increase, gathering of youths, ASB, Crime, damage to property vehicles and a dramatic increase in litter and potential pollution of the river.
Public safety	The idea of a back gate, which will take intoxicated patrons on to a Riverside path, will increase the risk injuries due to trips and falls but also human life due to drowning. At the proposed exit point onto the River path there is no lighting, as this stops after the Tesco Building, so late at night or earlier in winter this area is pitch black. There is also poor balustrading with a 3-4m drop into the River. Many local residents use this pathway for walking their dogs if this is granted new access route will attract not only large groups of inebriated Ale Trail groups that have consumed alcohol prior to visiting the taproom but also large groups of youths, which could make this area a no go zone for local residents.
To prevent public nuisance	The building itself surely was not meant for the live music proposed even with the noise reduction measures and who will monitor this? I understand that the previous site used had noise pollution issues, and information from Freedom of Information highlighted a large amount of complaints relating to noise nuisance and ASB. Is the problem just being moved from one area in Greenfield to another, where it will be located closer to the residential properties than it was at their previous location. The proposals are also suggesting 'Events' which generally means live music and PA systems and outside tables. This has previously been an issue at the Railway with the noise travelling throughout the valley which is hundreds of meter away. It will attract drinkers after other drinking facilities have closed in Uppermill and Greenfield causing noise from both the users and their vehicles. There will also be an increase in noise from people in the smoking areas, people waiting for taxis and the extraction units proposed. We already have a massive litter problem in the local area caused by Tesco shoppers and this no doubt will add to it.

- 1. No access onto canal path, the entry and exit point should remain on Wellington Road.
- 2. CCTV on Entry and Exit points
- 3. All noise / music not audible to residential properties
- 4. Smoking area to be located on opposite side facing Tesco
- 5. No drinking outside or limitations on when this can happen.
- 6. A limited number of events per year, with resident consultation
- 7. Maybe at Whatsapp group for owners and residents where complaints and problems could be dealt with quicker.
- 8. Door staff on all events.
- 9. Staff monitoring outside activities of patrons
- 10. Planting of trees and bushes in buffer zone between building and fencing on Knoll Close.
- 11. The Fire escape proposed facing Knoll Close only to be used in emergency
- 12. Licensing hours to be restricted to 23:00 hours on Sunday to Thursday and 00:00 Friday and Saturday.
- 13. Live Music events to be restricted to finishing at 22:00 Sunday Thursday and 23:00 Friday and Saturday.
- 14. The buffer zone between the property and Knoll Close to be maintained to a high standard and ensure that any Trees, bushes or Shrubs do not impact on the properties directly next to the buffer zone this includes any structure damage caused by Tree roots.
- 15. The building is to have extensive sound proofing to ensure that noise is kept to a minimum.
- 16. Can a silent running licence be considered similar to the one that Tesco were granted.
