Secondly, it provides a decision-making framework for the Council via its Licensing Committee, and it Licensing Premises Panel, to exercise its quasi-judicial functions under the Act. These two principles mean the policy must strike the right balance between the legitimate needs of businesses and demand for leisure and cultural activities and the need to protect those adversely affected by licensable activities.
