

Reason for Decision

The purpose of the report is to set out the Administration's priorities for 2017-2019 inclusive.

Executive Summary

From May 2011 this Administration has been working to ensure we are a Co-operative Borough. Building on co-operative principles, the early ambition for the Council was defined as:

- Strong Local Democracy
- Co-operative future for the community
- A regenerated Oldham
- New ways of delivering Council services
- Reconnect with communities and residents

This report now provides communication from the Council Leader which sets out this Administration's priorities for 2017-2019 inclusive.

Recommendations

Council is asked to note the contents of the report and endorse the Administration's priorities for 2017-2019 inclusive.

Priorities of the Administration

1.0 Background

- 1.1 From May 2011, this Administration has been working to ensure we are a Co-Operative Borough one where everyone does their bit and everyone benefits. Building on co-operative principles, the early ambition for the Council was defined as:
 - Strong Local Democracy
 - Co-operative future for the community
 - A regenerated Oldham
 - New ways of delivery Council services
 - Reconnect with communities and residents
- 1.2 In June 2014, Council endorsed the previous priorities of the Administration for 2014-2016 inclusive, most of which now continue as 'business as usual'. The past two years have seen significant progress in these areas including:
 - Setting up the Get Oldham Working Programme which saw us exceed the target of 2,015 work related opportunities created by 2015;
 - Regeneration of the Borough including the Old Town Hall into a cinema and restaurant complex and two new leisure centres;
 - A commitment to Open Democracy which now sees our Cabinet, Full Council and Planning Committee meetings live streamed. In addition to this we have seen:
 - The Council receive public questions and broadcast meetings over Social Media
 - Investment in our Youth Council and their facilities
 - Increasing levels of devolution of decisions and budgets to district level
 - Introduced the Oldham Living Wage for all Council Workers
 - Supported local businesses on Shaw and Lees High Streets and the A62 Failsworth Corridoor as well as supported new independent traders on Yorkshire Street, otherwise known as the Independent Quarter
 - Integrated Police and Fire Services into local District Town Halls

There are many other achievements that could be listed but this report is about looking to the future.

- 1.3 Oldham Council has successfully repositioned to become a Co-operative Council and remains committed to a co-operative future; one where citizens, partners and staff work together to improve the borough and create a confident and ambitious place.
- 1.4 These updated priorities, as set out in *appendix one* to this report, are set out under five key themes which Cabinet Members assigned to oversee each area.

The five themes are:

- Ambitious for everyone
- A Borough of Opportunities
- A Good Place to Live
- Thriving Districts and Neighbourhoods
- A Healthier and Caring Borough

These are based on a belief that Oldham as a Co-operative borough is a great place - and by working together we can make it even stronger.

We want this to be a borough with opportunities for all to reach their full potential: one with a good range of high quality places and homes to live in, with strong neighbourhoods and good transport links to the region's jobs and skills opportunities.

We also want Oldham to be a place we can all be proud of – one with cultural attractions and events that make it a destination for residents and visitors alike.

Working as a team – with residents and partners all doing their bit – we can build a better and brighter future for Oldham.

- 1.5 The priorities will be delivered based on the co-operative values which have underpinned our work to date:
 - **Fairness** we will champion fairness and equality of opportunity, and ensure working together brings mutual benefits and the greatest possible added value. We will enable everyone to be involved.
 - **Openness** we will be open and honest in our actions and communications. We will take decisions in a transparent way and at the most local level possible.
 - **Responsibility** we take responsibility for, and answer to our actions. We will encourage people to take responsibility for themselves and their actions. Mutual benefits go hand-in-hand with mutual obligations.
 - Working together we will work together and support each other in achieving common goals, making sure the environment is in place for self-help.
 - Accountability we recognise and act upon the impact of our actions on others, and hold ourselves accountable to our stakeholders.
 - **Respect** we recognise and welcome different views and treat each other with dignity and respect.
 - **Democracy** we believe and act within the principles of democracy, and promote these across the borough.

It is important that these priorities are delivered and become formal council policy. This provides a bridge from the political ambition of the administration through to the Council as an organisation charged with delivery. These priorities do not mean that other work ongoing isn't important or that focus will slow down, indeed some of the pledges are already 'work in progress'.
