Achievements as Cabinet Member for Employment and Enterprise

- The Council secured £210,418 for 2021/22 from the Government's Welcome Back Fund to support the safe and successful re-opening of high streets from Covid restrictions

- Free parking from 3pm at the Market Car Park is being introduced to boost footfall later on in the day from the 1st April 2022
- To date a total of £8,293,000 of Additional Restrictions Grant Funding has been spent and approx.. 600 businesses have been supported
- Oldham In Place Partnership (OIPP) secured a share of £8.225m (circa £2m for Oldham) as part of a GM Local Access Partnership bid to Access and Big Society Capital that supports the development of social and co-operative enterprises.
- Get Oldham Working (GOW) secured £3.5m Restart Contract to support citizens back into work currently at 104% of target for entry into employment.
- GOW secured National Careers Service extension offering free information, advice, and guidance.
- JE:TS (Job Entry: Targeted Support) programme continued into 2022 with 246 job starts (110% of target).
- Working Wardrobe project secured through partnership working with Registered Providers of Social Housing – Launch date late March 2022.
- Youth Hub launched October 2022 - targeting support for 19–24-year-old in partnership with Job Centre Plus. Agreement to expand provision with JCP as part of our new Youth Employment programme.
- New Children Looked After engagement programme launched in January 2022 - currently engaged with 52 care leavers, 5 have progressed into employment, apprenticeship, or training.

Work in the community

- Shadow cabinet member for Housing and Homelessness. Member of the cross-party environmental group, Oldham Music Service (Music Awards) and Oldham Economic Development Board at Oldham Council. Substitute member of the GMCA Overview and Scrutiny Committees. Substitute member of planning committee, performance and value for money committee, and traffic regulation order panel at Oldham Council.
- Board member of Oldham Coliseum and Oldham Credit Union.
- 100% attendance at Oldham Council meetings.
- Participated in the cross-party boundary review group, and on the response to Planning for the Future.
- Moved successful Council Motions on Ancient Woodlands, making street harassment a crime, tackling litter, preventing modern slums in Oldham, and urban meadows and bee corridors. Successfully revised the Council Motion on Planning for the Future.
- Questions asked to Full Council on the national Home Office-sponsored Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse (IICSA), business support ahead of the customs changes after departure from the EU, emergency funding for walking and cycling support under coronavirus, antibody testing, equality objectives, reporting from the independent investigation into CSE, the impact of Covid on social housing, and the environmental impact of the development of Saddleworth School, among others.
- Other work directly addressed to the council has covered Equalities Objectives (currently 15 months overdue), revisions of the Council's employment practice and communications strategy in response to the independent investigation into CSE, identifying sites with potential environmental contamination for review, review of the PFI contract with EOn for street lighting, review of the Council's approach to alley gating and environmental health, Assets of Community Value, tree planting programmes among others.

- Pothole repairs across the ward, including identifying extensive road issues in need of greater repair ahead of next year's creation of the 2022–25 plan for resurfacing.
- Agreement of the introduction of a new 20mph limit on Den Lane in Springhead, as part of the introduction of more 20mph speed limits across the district where appropriate.
- Part of the team discussions to address the traffic issues around the schools in Medlock Way, including getting a clear analysis of traffic levels inside and outside school times, introducing additional signage for the schools, and bidding in for funding to introduce traffic reduction schemes across the area.
- Reserved funding from 2019–20 and 2020–21 councillor budgets to reintroduce a VAS on Rhodes Hill.
- Pursuing appropriate weight restrictions for specific streets in the neighbourhood.
- Work underway to introduce double yellow lines in limited locations to address road safety issues.
- Addressing incomplete repairs and works in response to residents' issues
- Roads surveys undertaken in multiple locations across the ward (Under Lane, Cooper Street and Medlock Way) to identify specific traffic patterns and issues

Parks and public environment

- Organised clearance of fallen trees on Medlock Way and Old Street
- Advice and support for residents on overhanging trees, including working with neighbours where trees are on private residences
- Delivered overdue work on Phillimore Street in Lees, to repair and reinstate the wall adjacent to the graveyard
- Identifying Japanese Knotweed for treatment on private and public locations
- Tracking works done by infrastructure contractors and ensuring reinstatement of public space to original levels
- Ensured graffiti is cleared from various public domain sites, including substations, fences, and public buildings
- Organised repairs to bridges on Thornley Brook, Medlock Way, and on steps from new Academy to Old Street.
- Replacement of unsafe fencing between Oldham Road and linear path
- Organised reinforcement work to retaining wall on Cooper Street (outstanding since 1990s)
- New handrail and cleared path for residents in supported housing and Old Mill House and Hood Square
- Installation of new warning signs on dog fouling in multiple locations across the ward.
- Reporting and follow-up on fly-tipping at sites across the ward

Housing, planning, and enforcement

- Supporting residents with applications to social housing (including organising specific support for residents without internet access during lockdown).
- Support for residents with issues around homelessness, and those in long term temporary accommodation.
- Supporting residents to ensure their views are heard as part of the planning process. Particularly during the first lockdown, resolving a number of issues when public notifications on applications were not providing residents with sufficient time to respond. Similar problems have also been identified during the introduction of the new IT systems in the planning department. Have ensured that the planning department have extended deadlines to ensure residents have had sufficient time to respond.
- Specific support for the campaigns on Knowls Lane and Stonebreaks, where there are significant implications for local infrastructure, including transport, healthcare, and education.
- Multiple support for residents on enforcement issues, including around conservations areas, health and safety during construction, beaches of planning conditions or restrictions.

- Support for residents with complex applications, including listed buildings, work in conservation areas, and with solar power installation.

Business grants and coronavirus support

- Support for businesses including resolving issues around business rates that were preventing grants being issued, following up to ensure payments come on time, resolving issues around eligibility and payment.
- Providing information on grants and support for community groups, including specific funding for making Springhead Community Centre coronavirus safe.
- Working with GMCA to get guidance issued around care homes visits, and support for residents to enable them to meet with relatives under lockdown.
- Providing support and information around use of sporting facilities and parks.
- Ensuring supported collections for waste in place for residents where needed

Drainage and flooding issues

- Specific support for residents with issues around drainage, particularly where there has been water ingress into individual houses
- Identification of responsibility for flooding issues between owners, United Utilities, the Council, and the Environmental Agency to ensure the appropriate response can be taken.

Crime and antisocial behaviour

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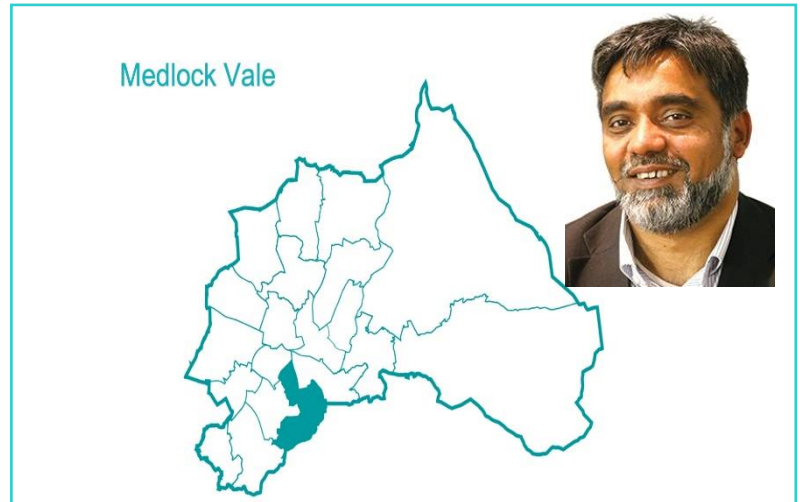

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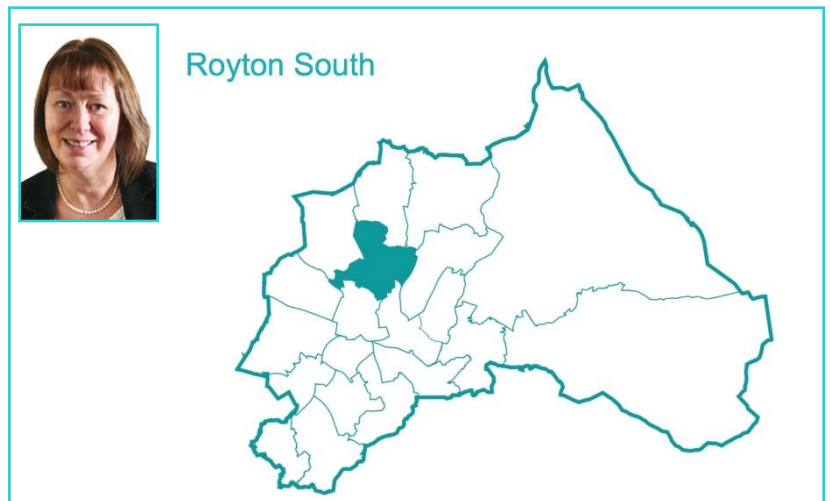
Cllr Marie Bashforth - Royton South Ward

My Ward priorities

My primary role is to represent Royton South

Ward and the people who live here. To respond to resident's queries and investigate their concerns. Listening to residents and then representing their views on council.

Communication with residents by telephone or email, always a top priority.



Surgeries - Due to the Pandemic the bigger face to face meetings with residents have not been possible over the past two years, but we are putting these back into place now and looking towards setting up surgeries again.

Street Surgeries - Along with face-to-face surgeries, we are going to start up our street surgeries again, which always worked well and means we can get to speak to the residents who want to talk to and tell us their issues.

Royton Town Hall and Library - We continue to work towards the renovation of Royton Town Hall and the Library. The project is ongoing and is progressing. In fact, some of the more structural work will be starting in mid-March this year. Which is exciting. The Town Hall should remain the Hub of the town for residents and should be accessible and usable for everyone. This will include a fit for purpose library, that everyone can use in all sorts of different ways.

Growth and Development of Royton Centre - We are working with private and public sector partners to support that growth and development.

Building on our unique heritage - wanting to make Royton a thriving place to live, work and socialise. We are promoting volunteering opportunities so residents can get involved in the community and do their bit.

Outdoor Spaces - We also want to increase the use of our outdoor spaces; we have some lovely parks and walking trails. And these spaces provide an opportunity for residents to take control and improve their health. There are local sports and park clubs to be used, so promoting these activities is important.

Work in the community

Personal Casework directed to me from residents

Meeting with residents one to one or in larger groups and meetings has not been possible over the past year. So, communication has been mainly by telephone and email.

Along with this work I am also involved in.

- Supporting residents whilst work is taking place in their immediate area due to private land development to ensure all planning criteria is being followed and when this is not happening to ensure we act on their behalf to correct any breaches of the planning conditions put in place.
- Providing a bridge between residents and the council.
- Being an advocate for local residents and signposting them to the right people at the council.
- Keeping residents informed about the issues that affect them.
- Don't Trash Oldham - attending regular Litter Picks around the area.

As much as I did come into this local political role to be here for local residents, over the years it has become clear to me that by taking on more 'council based' roles I can actually do more for our residents in Royton. Everything I become involved in, invariably comes back to my work and life in Royton.

The roles I have taken, have involved work that is borough wide, remembering that Royton is part of the borough, and that all the subjects and areas that are covered and improved mean that the whole of the borough benefit from decisions made and improvements made to all the services involved in that role, this would include Royton and Royton residents.

Adaptations Panel (When face to face meetings were possible) - Allocating funding from the Better Care Fund, we looked at applications from families who had family members in hospital or other care facilities, but who, with the right adaptations to the family home could be cared for in their own home and so be with their families.

Our aim was to approve the applications where possible, grant the funding and arrange for support for the work to be carried out. We scrutinised all applications to make sure the funding was being spent in the correct way.

I am on the Licensing Committee

Chair of the Learning Disability Partnership Board (2018 – 2020)

This board works to make Oldham a better place to live for people who have a learning disability and supports their families

Such as

- Is there the support individuals need to live long and healthy lives?
- Are individuals being treated with dignity and respect
- Are they able to live at home with family or independently but with the right support? And be close to their families and friends.
- And are they able to maintain relationships and get the support they need to have a healthy, safe and fulfilling life

The Board challenges professional bodies, to improve the delivery of services to the people and families who need them.

Ensures money is spent on good quality services and the Board is consulted and involved with regard to plans or changes that will affect everyone with a learning disability or their carers.

The Domestic Violence Partnership

The purpose of this partnership is to ensure and work towards a coordinated response from all partners including the Police, the MASH Team, Social Services, and all voluntary organisations.

This Partnership undertook a lot of work, which over the years has helped to bring forward a bigger awareness of the dreadful issue of domestic violence in our communities.

Such as;

White Ribbon Accreditation

The White Ribbon is there to promote the message of respect and leading by example.

White Ribbon status is an official accreditation and highlights our commitment to ending violence against women. This accreditation is now in place and a number of our councillors have become White Ribbon champions.

Chair of the Health and Well Being Board (2020 to 2022) - Something I wanted to do, as wanted to have more say and input on how our Health and Well Being Services are commissioned and delivery throughout the borough.

The Board brings together a large group of people and is always very well attended. We have GPs, Nurse Practitioners, Care Providers, Housing Providers, the police, community residents and the voluntary sectors.

Our biggest and most recent work is around the very clear and worrying health inequalities in our borough. In order to help us with this work we want to involve more people in our meetings. Leadership of the council have the final say on how services are commissioned and how they are delivered, so their input would be valuable.

Everyone involved with this Board have a vital role into looking at why we have these inequalities, what they can lead to, and what can be done to bring about positive changes.

Health Inequalities - What are the five main causes of health inequalities?

There is ample evidence that social factors,

- Education
- Health service provision (GPs, hospital services)
- Employment status
- Income level
- Gender and ethnicity
- And housing, is it good quality housing?
- Financial situations and debt management

The Board considers services offered and are they delivered well.

GP services, Housing, Early Start and nursery services, Pharmacy coverage and access, Antenatal services, Smoking cessation services, Dental services, and accessibility.

Health Inequalities can lead to.

Heart disease, Hypertension, Stroke, Heart failure, Diabetes, Cancer, Liver disease, mental health issues and respiratory disease.

These facts show how important work around health inequalities is, due to wide range of areas and illnesses health inequalities affect.

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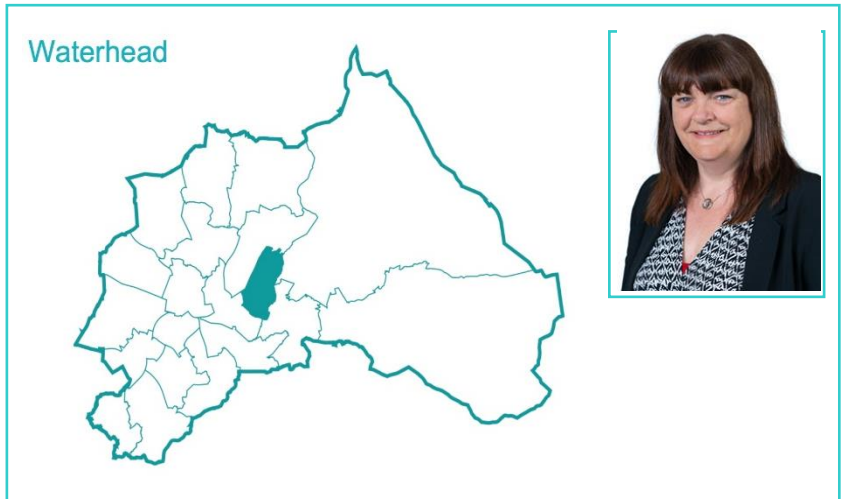

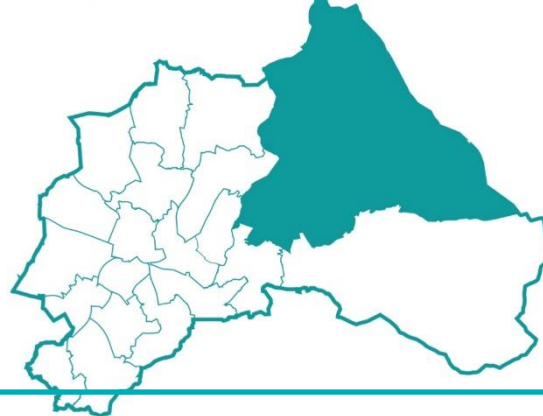

Last May I was elected to represent Royton South for the third time. To continue to represent the area I was brought up in and went to school in, remains the greatest privilege. Thank you to everyone who voted for and put their faith in me. Last May, I was also elected to the position of Deputy Leader of Oldham Council and given the Cabinet responsibility of Neighbourhoods.

The past year has been a combination of continuing to deal with the pandemic and the fallout out for local business and our residents, to the focusing on borough wide activity as part of my role as Deputy Leader and beginning to see the realization of some of our long-term ambitions for Royton.

As part of my role as Cabinet Member for Neighbourhoods, I launched the Don't Trash Oldham initiative. The state of the town and the amount of rubbish and dumping of waste we have seen over recent years was the biggest issue raised with me in the lead up to the local elections and this was true of nearly every other ward in Oldham. Don't Trash Oldham is a commitment to clean every street, road, and alleyway in Oldham over 10 months on a ward-by-ward basis. As a ward Councillor I continue to deal with casework on an almost daily basis, we hold regular litter picks and get involved in community events. This year in Royton, we have finally seen the work begin on Royton Town Hall. We have been campaigning for this since I got elected and secured the funding some time ago but crucially last year we secured a timetable for works to begin and this has now started. There will be £2.4M investment in Royton Town Hall and Library, this will include the demolition of the rear extension and the creation of a public space. We will bring back to life some of the buildings original features but make it accessible to all Roytoners and a genuine community hub.

This year I have been successful in a bid to the Local Improvement Fund to tackle speeding on Salmon Fields, I have also secured funding from Greater Manchester and combined this will mean £40,000 spent on traffic calming measures. This will also coincide with the introduction of a crossing at the old railway tracks as it crosses Salmon Fields, this area is being opening up to attract more cyclists and walker.

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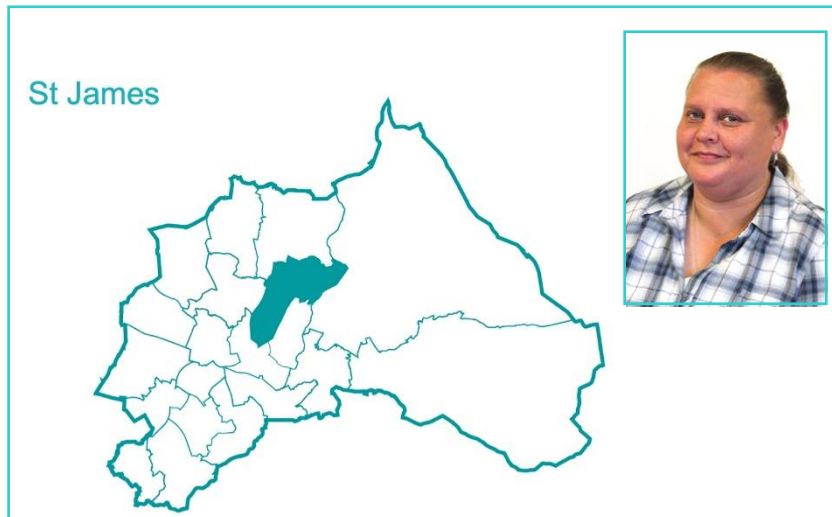

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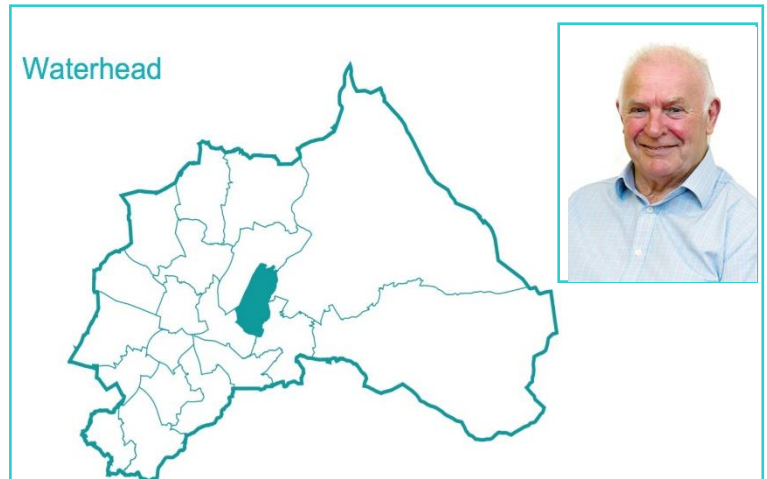

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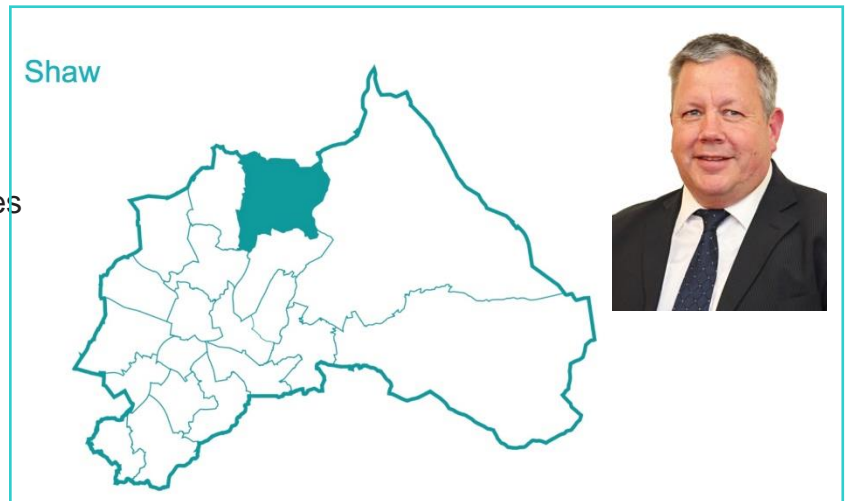

2021 has continued to be a different way of working with only the last few months seeing any sort of return to normality, with some council meetings reverting to the Civic Centre and other places rather than wholly online. This return is welcome, and I know this view is shared by my ward colleagues. I am a school governor at Crompton House School and have been fully involved with the effects of Covid 19 on school life and have championed ensuring that pupils have had access to learning tools whilst needing to work from home.

I have joined the newly formed committee of Shaw and Crompton Royal British Legion after the branch closed last year.

- I support residents with housing repairs, rehousing, neighbour disputes, healthcare complaints, council bins and rubbish removal, dog waste and new street litter or grit bins.
- As the former Shaw and Crompton Police Inspector, I continue to work closely with our local Police, the District Partnership, Parish Council, residents, and businesses of Shaw to resolve the problem of anti-social behaviour and a perceived increase in crime, which GMP deny.. This work stays an on-going battle to ensure that residents have a safe place to live.
- Along with my colleagues, I continue to challenge the Greater Manchester Spatial Framework, and its successor, working to achieve the best outcome possible for residents' homes, jobs, and the environment by opposing the appalling loss of our green spaces. Brownfield First!
- I have worked with residents to ensure that we keep adequate bus services in Shaw and Crompton to meet the needs of residents particularly in the current Covid 19 climate with many forms of transport restricted
- I continue to be the lead Councillor in Shaw dealing with the aftermath of the St Paul's Church roof collapse. This is an uphill battle complicated by a restrictive attitude of Historic England who are happy to obstruct demolition of this site but incapable of supplying anything other than words to remediate the problem that has so far cost hundreds of thousands of pounds to reduce to a pile of rubble. Covid 19 has not helped in letting this eyesore stagnate.
- Along with my colleagues I formally object to planning applications if I believe they are inappropriate or not a benefit to residents, new council rules and proposed Tory Planning Law

changes do not help.

- I continue to drive the campaigns forward for a new Health Centre for Shaw and Crompton and from these campaigns I am hopeful that the promised new health centre by 2023 becomes a reality.
- I constantly deal with issues surrounding speeding vehicles, Buckstones Road and Crompton Way are two examples, and I have had some success in getting the relevant authorities to look at education, engineering, and enforcement solutions to deal with this problem.
- I work with the Highways Department to have the potholes, blocked grids and poor footpaths resurfaced or repaired.
- I regularly pursue complaints of fly tipping around Shaw,
- Along with my ward colleagues and in my role as Ward Councillor, I meet regularly with local groups, ensuring that our most asset, our countryside, stays well looked after and ecologically sustainable. I continue to ensure that this area is supported and safe to use by all. Most recently we have been instrumental in agreeing a new dog sign that will hopefully be introduced by the start of the nesting season.
- I continue to work with residents and a variety of agencies for a resolution to on-going flooding problems, primarily in the areas of Dunwood Park, Grains Road, Beal Lane.
- I am pleased to report that we have now been able to resume Ward Surgeries face to face (see below).

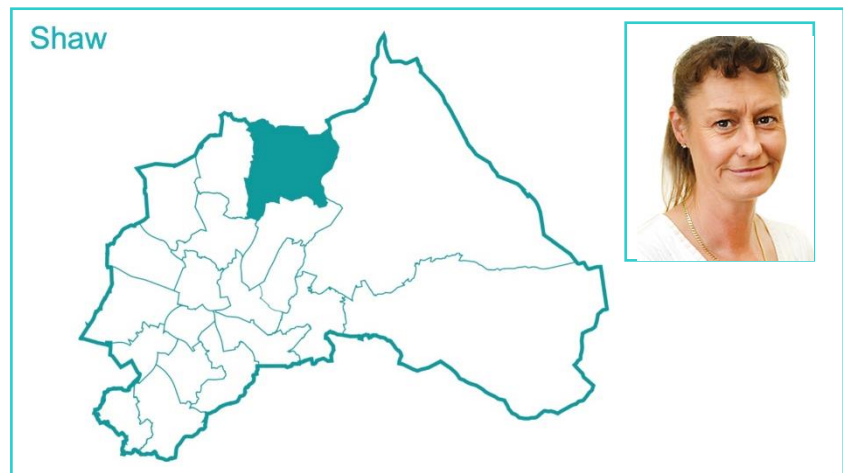

Work in the community

Throughout 2021 the Covid-19 Pandemic has continued to constrict our economy, freedoms and ways of life significantly. The Community of Shaw has continued to embrace these challenges by supporting our neighbours, shopping local to sustain our small businesses and in most cases, following the lockdown guidance to protect our NHS and save lives. Unfortunately, many have lost loved ones to Coronavirus and my deepest condolences are with all that have suffered a bereavement this year. I have truly been inspired by the way our residents have stepped up to the challenges we faced, and my sincere Thanks goes out to our Key Workers, NHS, and Emergency Services for the dedication they have shown to us all throughout this dreadful time.

Although the ways we have been working have changed dramatically, with far more emphasis being placed on telephone and electronic communications, the issues faced have remained very similar to previous years but with far more emphasis on our Community. Throughout the year I have continued to work hard for my residents offering support, advice, and guidance to help meet their needs and resolve their issues where possible.

I have continued to demand Better for Shaw by: -
Continuing to campaign for a new Health Centre for Shaw and Crompton.
Supporting Businesses through their applications for the available Business Grants.
I have worked with residents to overcome issues around school attendance and home schooling, together with issues around free school meals and access to appropriate information technology.
I have liaised with Council departments such as Environmental Health, Waste and Highways to resolve incidences of Fly Tipping, Dog Fouling and missed rubbish collections to keep our communities clean.

I have attended Full Oldham Council meetings, together with my Shadow Portfolio briefings, asking ward and cabinet questions together with submissions of motions to influence future policy decisions.

I have campaigned to increase access to changing places across our Borough, a campaign which Tesco have now signed up to and use within their television adverts.

I have attended training on Safeguarding Children's & Adults and Social Media amongst others

I have attended Shaw & Crompton Parish Council meetings and served on the Environment Committee working with The Friends of Crompton Moor to improve and enhance the beautiful nature we are so lucky to have on our doorstep.

Work in the community

The Council has continued to be at the frontline in responding to the Covid19 pandemic, including distributing emergency food and medicine, providing vital social care, running testing centres and now rolling out the virus vaccines. Colleagues and I have been telephoning the most vulnerable in our wards to ensure they are well, and they are aware of the assistance that is available to them.

Throughout 2021 the pandemic also had a huge impact on the way that the Council and Councillor's worked which has consistently evolved as the pandemic has evolved.

Since May 2021, I have been attending constitutional meetings on your behalf at Oldham Civic Centre, most other meetings have been held virtually, accessed via phone or laptop. I have undertaken training on using this technology so that I could continue to represent you throughout this difficult time.

In my ward, following the lifting of restrictions, I have been able to return to a new normality visiting residents and having face to face conversations with those who have wished for me to assist them with any matters, I have still been available by e-mail or telephone for people to contact me if they have problems that they would like my assistance with. During 2021 I have assisted over 250 of our residents with personal issues who have contacted me via phone, email, or social media.

As part of the council's #Don'tTrashOldham campaign, myself and my ward colleagues have been arranging litter picks and joining community groups when able to do so as well as encouraging residents to #LoveWhereYouLive.

For the past year I have been acting as the Deputy Cabinet Member for Corporate Services. In this role I have been working with officers to ensure the residents of Oldham are provided with an improved service from the Council and an improved digital service alongside this. Following the closure of Access Oldham, due to the pandemic, the availability of face-to-face appointments is now being reviewed and I'm working with officers as to the options available.

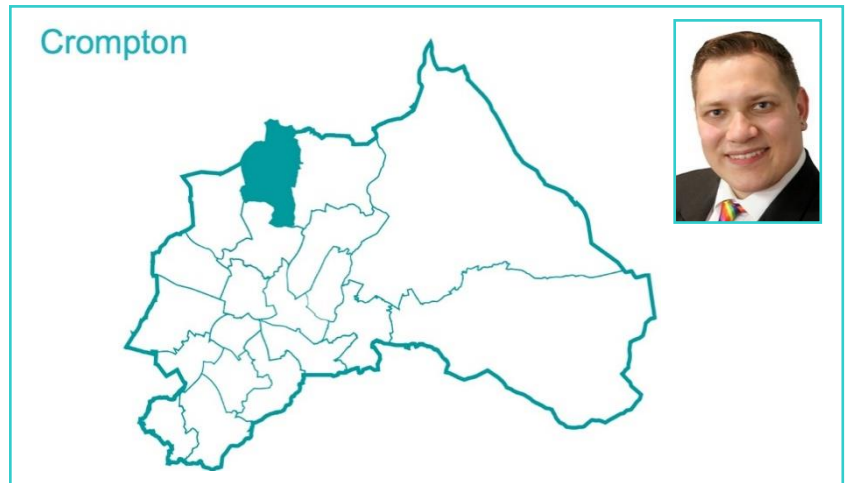

- Attend ward surgeries, organised every week, on a rota basis with my Shaw and Crompton colleagues – this allows me to listen to residents' concerns personally, rather than them having to put it in an email.
- I am the Shadow Cabinet Member for Health and Social Care, which I really enjoy as it gives me the opportunity to hold the administration to account while also offering other alternatives.

- I chair The Autism Way Forward Board on which we discuss ways to champion the Autism Strategy and improve lives for those with Autism and SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities).
- Attend the Learning Disability Partnership Board where I hold members to account and discuss ways to champion the Learning Disability Strategy and improve lives for those with SEND.
- I am a member of Shaw and Crompton Parish Council and I am currently its Vice Chair and Vice Chair of the Events, Promotions and Grants Committee.
- Attended the mandatory training on “Safeguarding – Children and Adults” – “Appeals Home to school Transport Committee”
- Continue to campaign to get a new Health Centre for the residents of Shaw and Crompton.
- Shaw and Crompton Councillors met with the Accountable Officer from the Clinical Commissioning Group (NHS) to raise concerns over the GP Practices in Royton and Crompton Health Centre and the services they provide. We have chased the progress of the New Health Centre in Shaw.
- Lancashire Day was on 27 November 2021 and this year the Lancashire flag was flown in High Crompton Park. Followed by the proclamation from Shaw and Crompton’s Town Crier and attended by Shaw and Crompton Parish Council Chairman.
- Changes in bus services continue to be a problem for residents in Crompton - we continue to work with TfGM to find solutions to make the best of a bad situation.
- We have ensured our young people have something to do in the school holidays by funding activities throughout Shaw and Crompton.
- Continuing to sort local environmental issues such as dog fouling, litter, and fly-tipping
- I continue to raise concerns about the state of the roads, and I'm working to fix potholes, surface erosion and make sure poor roads are part of a programmed works plan for replacement or treatment.
- Supporting community groups such as High Crompton Park Friends Group and Homewatch Groups.
- Member of MIO (Made In Oldham) Care appointed by the Council –Thoroughly enjoyed participating in the meetings as board member, I attend the Health Scrutiny Board where I can observe Oldham and GM-wide health plans plus adding my own suggestions. I also sit on many other outside GM Health-related bodies.
- In addition, I offer general support for Crompton Cricket, Crompton Bowling Clubs, and Crompton Football Club – where we have used our ward budget to purchase football kits with the message ‘Love Crompton’ to inspire the next generation of young people to ‘Love Where They Live’.
- Working with community groups to help organise this year’s Jubilee Festivities.
- Worked with the Shaw and Crompton Events Group to host the Christmas Lights Event in Shaw town centre and support them in their fundraising attempts as well as their St George’s Day Event.
- Supported events such as The Tour of Britain Bike Race and hope to see the continuation of such a great legacy such as organising bike rides through Shaw and Crompton.

- Attended the Holocaust Remembrance Service at Crompton War Memorial.
- Support the High Crompton Park Friends to keep our park beautiful.
- Event lighting has now been achieved on The Big Lamp roundabout, the tree will be lit in various colours to celebrate the saints of the UK as well as Easter, Christmas and Pride events.

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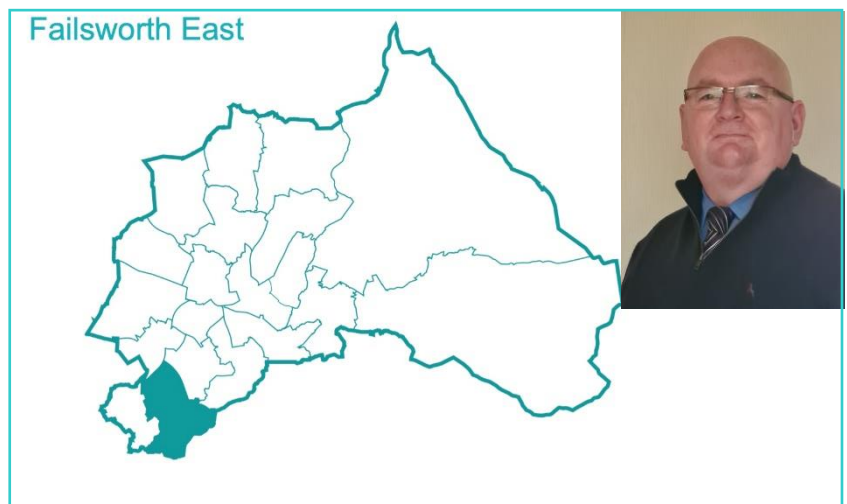

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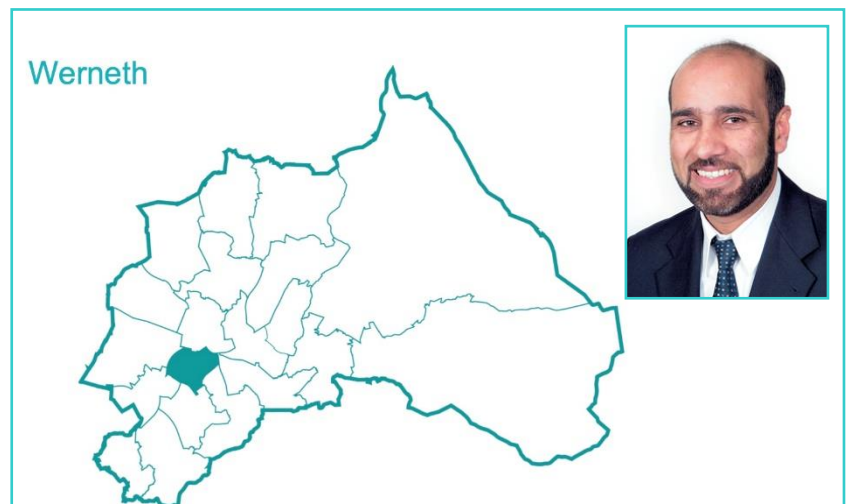

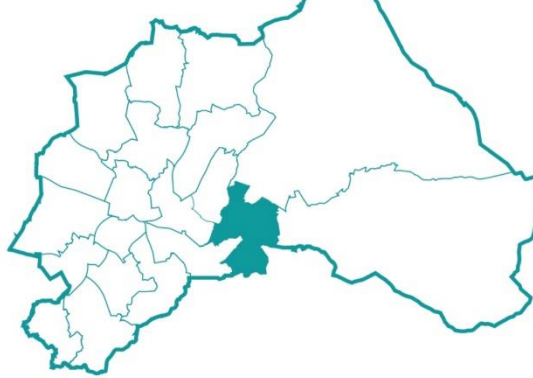

Work in the community

My first year as a councillor for everyone in Grotton, Springhead and Lees has been a huge privilege and plenty of hard work. Despite being shadow cabinet member for Employment & Enterprise, the vast majority of my time, energy and effort goes into casework directly affecting the ward I'm so happy to represent. Oldham Council is very large organization responsible for delivering over a thousand services with a budget of about £100 million – it's my job to argue for the best outcomes for everyone in our ward and for those who come to me with specific problems or concerns.

Residents often wonder what councillors actually do and how much they get paid. I am paid a total allowance of £12,969. Along with nearly all my colleagues, I have claimed no expenses for the year. Councillors are free to devote as much or as little time as they see fit to the work. Fortunately, I am self-employed and work mainly from home, so am happy and able to devote a significant portion of my week to residents' concerns and council business (this is one reason it's called an allowance rather than pay..... if I divided the allowance by the number of hours worked it would be far less than minimum wage). In a single year, with my ward colleague Cllr Sam Al-Hamdani, we may have over 300 individual pieces of casework either completed or in progress.

As well as being contactable by phone, email and Facebook, Sam and I hold two in person surgeries per month for those residents unable to use email/Facebook. These are on the first and third Tuesdays of each month with two sessions per day 12-2pm and 6-7pm. I also actively go out and find casework by knocking on residents' doors every week and asking how I can help residents. There are about 5000 homes in our ward and my team and I aim to knock on every door at least once per year. As well as door knocking, my team and I keep in touch with everyone by posting regular Focus newsletters through each door several times a year.

In 2021 the Council has continued to respond proactively to the impact of the Covid pandemic. From September, Council meetings – of the full Council and its statutory boards and panels – started to be organised in-person. Most other meetings, interactions with council staff and training sessions have been held virtually. I have actively participated in all the virtual sessions. Unfortunately, ill health prevented my work outside my home. Even with this restriction, I believe I have been able to represent ward residents and businesses and promote their best interests through this difficult time. Because of my ill-health, unfortunately I will not contest the election in May 2022.

I have responded by telephone and by email to requests from members of the community for information or for help and I have kept in touch with local community groups.

- The Lees, Springhead and Grotton Business (LSG) Hub continues to support local small businesses and the community at large. I continue to support the Hub.
- The scheme to improve the central Lees village area with funding from the Local Investment Fund started work early in 2021. Fellow Councillor Hewitt and I allocated extra funding for the scheme to provide additional green amenity for the area. Members of LSG Hub helped with additional planting to brighten the area.
- To reduce the unhealthy impact on children of air pollution, I met again with council officers and heads of Hey with Zion and St Edwards schools to plan for a scheme to cut down the amount of traffic close to the schools. Funding has now been secured from Oldham's Local Improvement Fund and from Greater Manchester's Safer Streets programme. Work will start early in 2022.
- I provided additional support for the Lees Park Eco Centre and Growing Hub which provides training and facilities for residents, working especially with children and young people.
- I continued as Deputy Cabinet Member with special responsibility for early childhood development. A partnership of voluntary organisations, staff of the

council and commissioned services developed an Early Years Strategy and priority actions to improve outcomes for infants and young children. The focus in this first year has been to increase enrolment of 2-year-olds in early years services and to provide improved information for parents about activities for children under five years of age.

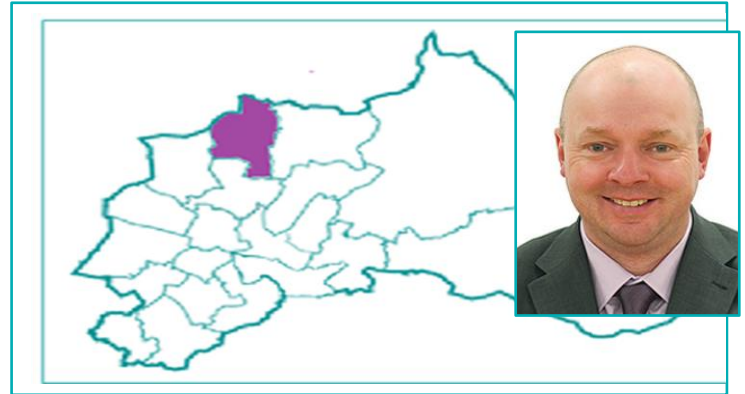

Following a spate of burglaries and attempts around the Warren Lane area I met with residents after which I arranged an online meeting with residents and the police. A close community group has been setup working together to improve the safety of the area. I followed this up with a door knocking session accompanied by two PCSOs we spoke to a number of residents and distributed packs which included information to keep properties and vehicles safe as well as a light timer and window alarms.

I have been working with residents in Holts following complaints of bicycles and scooters creating a risk to pedestrians. Myself and ward colleagues contributed towards two new baffle rails to restrict the speed of cyclists and encourage them to dismount and others using the area.

I have supported numerous residents with housing and other issues on Alt, we continue to support Alt Together including working with residents to clean up the area. Following reports of fly-tipping on Holts Lane we are working with council officers to address this.

I am involved in initiatives and support lots of residents, too many to put in a single report I encourage Alexandra Ward residents to get in touch should they wish to raise any issues or discuss anything of interest.

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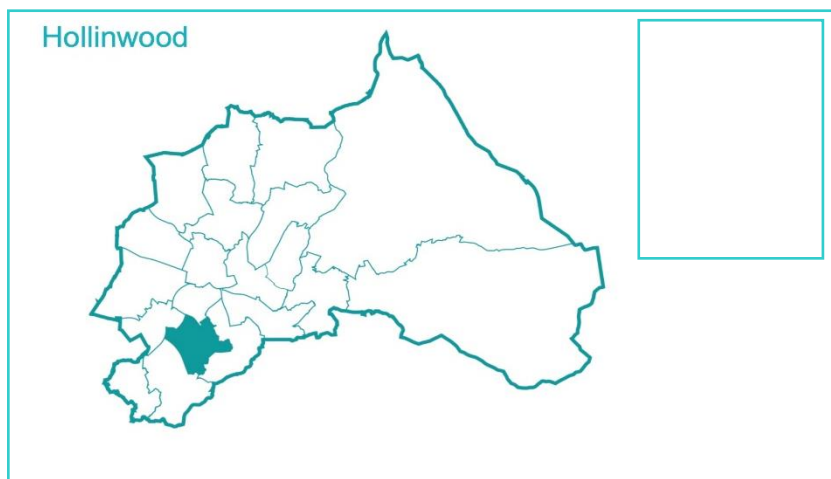

- **Green Royton:** finalised Places for Everyone, ensuring Royton's Green Belt protected at Thornham Old Road and Hanging Chadder. Organised community litter picks on Holly Estate, Haggate and Kingston Drive and ensured fly-tipping removed as reported to me. Supported bid to improve Dogford Park and delivered better play and landscaping in Royton Park. Organised weekly cleaning of library/town hall entrances to remove pigeon droppings and ensured prevention measures included in renovation.
- **Supporting Royton residents:** responded to individual complaints from residents including graffiti removal; missed bins; potholes; planning application and enforcement queries; benches; dog fouling; noise complaints. Took up issues raised by Rochdale Road Slow Down campaign and working to set up Community Speed Watch; surveyed local residents about Thornham Mill proposals, kept them up to date with progress and represented their views to Planning; met regularly with local police to raise issues concerning residents; responded to parking complaints on Tandle Hill Road and got Council to improve litter collection in the Country Park – there is now a member of staff based there.

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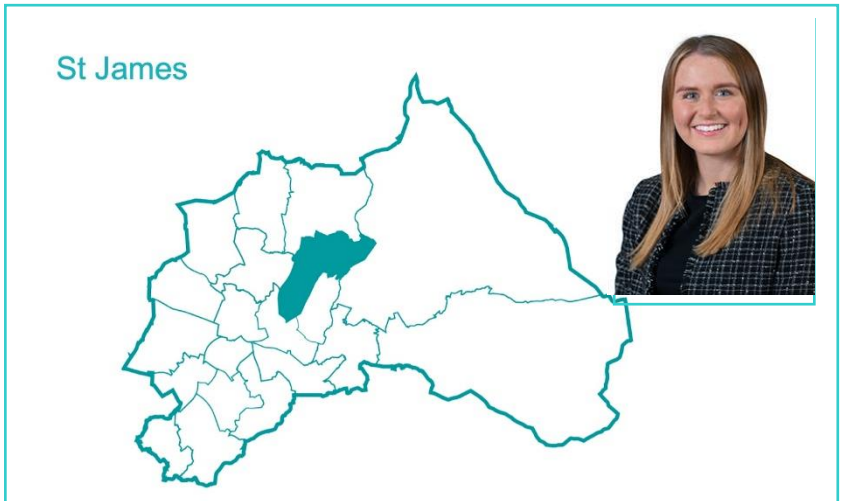

I have also worked with a local community group to submit a bid to the Local Improvement Fund to develop a much-needed community facility at the Sacred Heart Church building in Derker. Sadly, this was not supported, and the building remains empty and unused. I will continue working with the community to achieve this facility.

Since May 2021 I have attended several community social events from coffee mornings to a Christmas sing along. I have also used the community budget allocated to me to fund Christmas decorations for the three Care Homes across the ward, supporting events such as the Flower Show at Sholver Community Centre and summer activities for families in Stoneleigh Park.

- 77 new homes in Diggle, Saddleworth
- Approved potential homes: 160 in Chadderton; 98 in Oldham; 23 in Moorside

Environment & Green Neighbourhoods

- **Pocket Park** – Martha St and Ripon Street. Creating attractive green safe spaces for local residents and for children to play and relax in.
- **Landscaping and footpath** - created to encourage walks along Mitchell St/Trafalgar St

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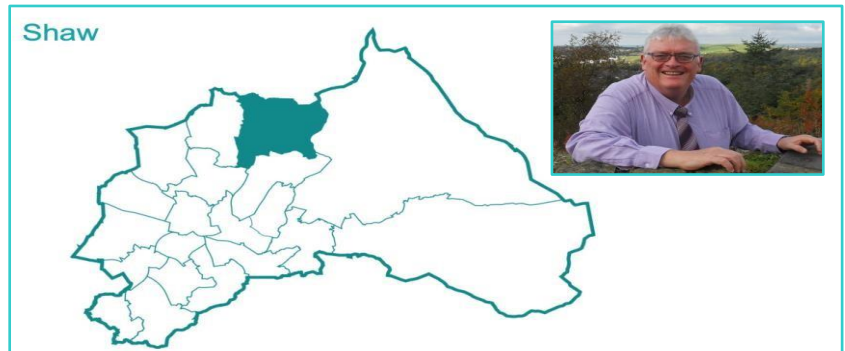

Work in the community

This 2021/22 Annual Report gives a clear account of my typical activities on behalf of my constituents throughout what I believe has been the most testing period of my time in office. I am proud to say throughout this crisis both myself and my Shaw and Crompton Liberal Democrat colleagues have remained dedicated to representing Shaw and Crompton Ward residents and we have continued to champion all issues for them.

On behalf of myself and my colleagues I would like to say a massive thank you to our NHS, Key Workers, and the whole Community for stepping up in our hour of need. We are far from out of the woods yet and it is still not business as usual, but we have been inspired and humbled by the resilience of our community.

Listening to residents:

- I keep up to date with residents' concerns by offering regular face to face Ward Surgeries and door knocking.
- I keep communication open with residents I am contactable by email and telephone.
- I reach out to the community and share important information on Twitter, Facebook, and my web site.

Some examples of my work:

- The above ways of communicating have allowed me to continue to manage a range of issues on behalf of residents such as, road repairs, housing repairs, rehousing requests, public rights of way, school applications, healthcare complaints, council bins and rubbish removal, dog waste and street litter, rubbish bins and grit bins to name just a few.
- I also liaise with Council departments on resident's behalf with regards to applications for Covid related benefits and on several business-support grants and schemes.

- I work closely with our local Police, the District Partnership, Parish Council, residents, and businesses of Shaw to resolve the problem of anti-social behaviour. This work remains an ongoing battle to ensure that residents have a safe place to live.
- I continue to challenge the Greater Manchester Spatial Framework and its successor Places for All, and work to achieve the best outcome possible for residents' homes, jobs, and the environment by opposing the appalling loss of our green spaces. For further information about the work, I do for this please refer to my website.
- I am a member of Greater Manchester Transport Committee where we are working to achieve a fully integrated, high-capacity transport system. A lack of investment and a de-regulated bus market means it is a constant battle to maintain key services for residents.
- Major changes are coming to bus services in Shaw and Crompton in April 2022. I have worked with TfGM officers to try and ensure these changes do not make the situation worse for users and hopefully improve it for many of them. However, with all changes there will be winners and losers.
- I formally object to planning applications if I believe they are inappropriate or not a benefit to residents. Shaw Asda's recent request for 24-hour deliveries and the conversion of the Weaver's Answer PH into an HMO are just two examples.
- I work constructively with developers who wish to build new homes on the Very/Yodel site and other areas of Shaw. However, such building projects require infrastructure improvements for them to work for example, new schools, better highways, and more health provision. Achieving these provisions is an ongoing battle for myself and my colleagues.
- My colleagues and I continue to drive the campaign forward for a new Health Centre for Shaw and Crompton. We now have a promise from the NHS to start the work.
- I continue to request regular vehicle speed monitoring on roads such as Buckstones Road, Crompton Way, and Hillside Avenue for example – with a view to the instalment of speed enforcement measures that can address and resolve these issues. Speeding traffic and poor-quality driving have clearly increased in the last 12 months or so.
- I work with the Highways Department to have the potholes, blocked grids and poor footpaths resurfaced or repaired. Most recently, following a great deal of negotiation, roads such as Mark Lane, Higher Park, Penmore Close and others have been resurfaced. Many more need repairs and resurfacing and I will continue to push for them.
- I regularly pursue complaints of fly tipping around Shaw, and I work very closely with the Environmental Health Department on this matter. Recently I organised the clearing of rubbish at Crompton Moor, Grains Road, Shaw Town Centre, Grain Bar, Jubilee and George's Playing Fields.
- I continue to work with residents and a variety of agencies for a resolution to on-going flooding problems, primarily in the areas of Dunwood Park, Woodend, Smallbrook Road, Grains Road, Grains Bar and Jubilee. Much needed improvements recently completed by the Environment Agency to Pencil Brook at Duchess Street and near the Park should help.

- As Chair of the Crompton Moor Users Group and in my role as Ward Councillor, I meet regularly with the group, working closely for this area of countryside that within our community remains very important. I continue to ensure that this area is maintained and safe to use by all. The recently updated Public Space Protection Order needs to be enforced more so a few mindless people are not permitted to spoil this beautiful area for the vast majority.
- I am a governor at St Joseph's school and as a parent myself I strive for our children's right to receive an education appropriate to their needs.
- I am Chair of the A V Davies Charity which works to help those in need and financial difficulty in specifically in Shaw and Crompton.
- I am a member of the LGA Councillors Forum, the LGA Audit Committee, LGA General Assembly and a Board member of Local Partnerships.
- I am a member of Groundwork GM and Vice Chair of its Audit Committee.
- On Oldham Council I serve on the Health & Wellbeing Board, Selection Committee, Appointments Committee, Clayton Playing Fields, and Full Council. I also serve on Corporate Safeguarding, Group Leaders, Mayor's briefings, Community Safety and Cohesion Board, Oldham Distress Fund, Oldham Leadership Board and Oldham Property Partnership.

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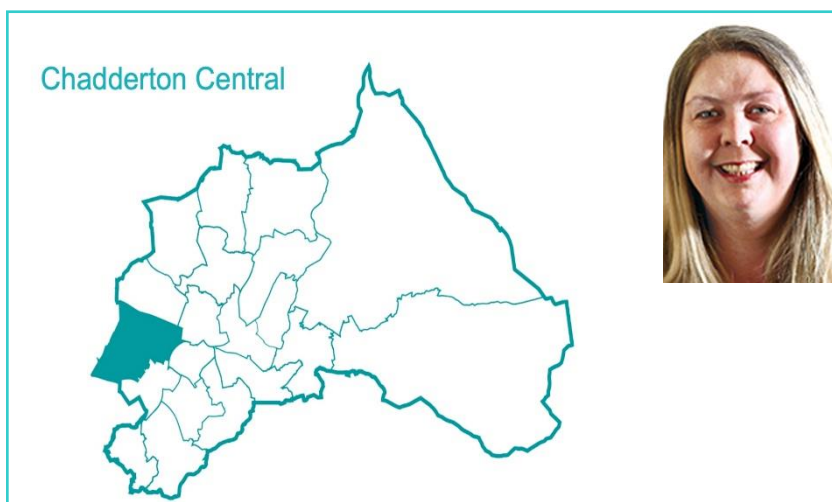

Work in the community

Created a Disability equipment loan scheme. I collect Wheelchairs, strollers, Zimmer frames, crutches, bed guards, shower chairs etc., with a view to assisting residents who may need to use them free of charge.

Working together with GMP and residents to resolve Anti-Social behavior on Queen Elizabeth playing Fields at Leicester/Warwick Road, which has been a successful project. I held a public meeting to enable residents to have their say and inform me of their concerns.

I assisted with various other people in enabling the Landlord and the Landlady of the Sun Inn, Oldham Road, Tracey and Russ Young, to gain a new 5-year VISA, after Russ had been informed, he had to return to Australia

A Company named Enviroil had been acting outside their operating licence and I had received numerous complaints from residents, regarding the odour and noise levels. I held a public meeting to hear the concerns of members of the community. I advised them to lodge their interests on the OMBC website under planning. Unfortunately, the action taken by officers has not resolved the situation and has now been passed to The Drivers Vehicle Standards Agency. Once they have completed their obligations it will be determined if the business can continue in its present form as the application to renew said licence begins in April.

I have carried out 4 community clean-up projects, in Beech Street/Ash Street, Victoria Street, Main Street and Princess Street, with assistance from Ian Monaghan who has supplied skips for all the projects. Along with this I arranged for a total clean-up of the ginnel at the back of Samuel Street, which was in a very bad state, with a rat infestation, by Regenda Homes

I organized for the Trees and bushes to be cut and the community area to be generally

cleaned and tidied up at Barons Court.

I have been involved in the very robust traffic calming measures on Lord Lane, which has a traffic accident hotspot. Work is about to commence in the very near future.

I arranged for the footpath on the fields at Somerset Road, to be reassembled and raised as it had sunk into the grass and covered in rainwater and mud. Work has started but is still ongoing

Following work carried out at the junction of Paddock Lane and Lord Lane, by United Utilities, the drains on Lord Lane had become seriously blocked. Following periods of rain, one of the junctions of the pipe work underground, would overflow flooding the garden of 274, with water, which entered the house through the air bricks, causing the electricity to fuse. Following numerous phone calls back and forth and a failed attempt to bring an end to the problem, it was eventually resolved.

There had been a collapsed drain underneath the pavement on Propps Hall Drive for over two years, when a resident complained to me. It was dangerous as it left an open hole which someone could very easily have fallen down. It took approximately 7 months for the repairs to be carried out by United Utilities, following untold phone calls to various departments

I have been involved in a new project at The Holy Family Church on Lord Lane. The congregation and Church Committee had taken the decision to create a Community Garden for the people of Failsworth, on a spare and unused piece of land at the back of the building. I agreed to donate £1,000 of my personal allowance to this venture, have attended operations several times and liaise with the project coordinator. The work is still ongoing, but it hoped the garden will be open to the public by April/May.

I assisted with the running of the Senior Citizen's Christmas Party, held in December, which was attended by 93 residents and was a total success

I have liaised with Highways department, after it was brought to my attention that no traffic road markings i.e., give way signs, were present at the junction of Mather Street/Ward Street

I arranged for the bushes which were overhanging the pavement, which made it impossible to pass with a pushchair or wheelchair, at the junction of Farm Street and Stott Street.

I was along with The Manchester VII Scouts, part of the acquisition of a 24-hour public defibrillator, which is now in place outside the Post Office on Lord Lane, where Matthew McCartan the owner, has agreed to pay for the running of the machine.

I have also assisted residents with various problems, including garden drains, flooded gardens, dropped Krebs, bulb planting which I have contributed £500 towards, parking problems outside St. Mary's School and involving GMP, housing problems and noisy and troublesome neighbours.

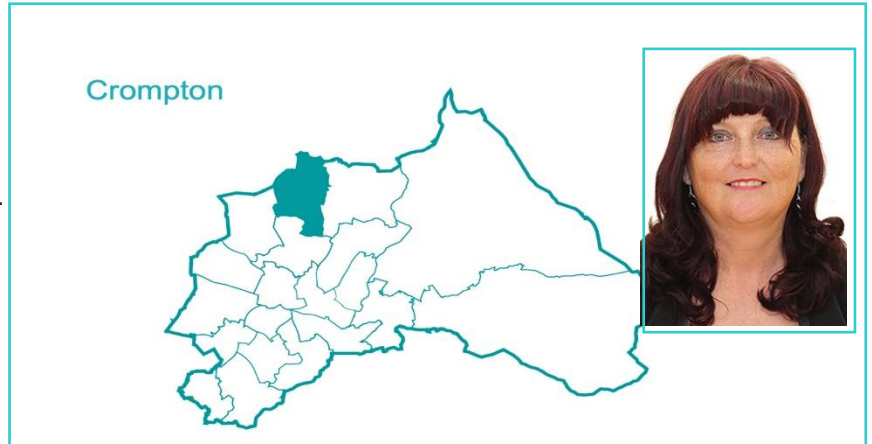

Work in the community

- It has been a very difficult year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. During the last twelve months the District Team, delivering services to the wards of Shaw and Crompton.
- A number of campaigns, which have rolled into one, is the “Love Where You Live” campaign in Crompton ward, has seen over the last 4 years 20,000 dog fouling leaflets hand delivered to every house in the ward (every year). We have banners installed at various locations around the ward, which identifies the different areas of our lovely ward. High Crompton, Crompton and Shaw. Myself and my colleagues have been praised by residents for doing this and want more banners in the inner parts of the ward. We are hoping to extend the campaign to the bins in the ward, which would remind residents to pick up after their dogs with the slogan” Bag It and Bin It”.
- Together with my five colleagues in Shaw and Crompton we hold ward surgeries, where members residents can come along and speak me, confidentially, and without interruption about sometimes their very personal issues which they cannot put into an email.
- I continue, along with my colleagues are campaigning for a new Health Centre in Shaw for the people of Shaw and Crompton. I have written to both GP Practices in Crompton Health Centre, requesting a meeting to discuss what they envisage for a new Health Centre and whether they want to be part of this fantastic journey when it comes to fruition. We now getting ever closer.
- I have had meetings with partners:
- Highways Officers – to explain what roads are the ones that need doing for example the ones the residents keep telling us about
- Member of Hopwood Trust appointed by the Council – continue to support them with their fundraising events and attend their meetings, plus general support for Crompton Cricket, Crompton Bowling Clubs, and Crompton Football Club – where we have used our ward budget to purchased football kits with the message ‘Love Crompton’ to inspire the next generation of young people to ‘Love Where They Live’.

There are a number of events and groups which happen in Shaw and Crompton and I am pleased to support these through funding or time:

- Shaw and Crompton Events Group who host the Christmas Lights Event in Shaw town centre
- Two Homewatch Schemes
- St George's Day event
- High Crompton Park Friends Group

We again remembered on Holocaust Memorial Day, where we had a service at Crompton War Memorial, with Farrowdale House Preparatory School, Crompton Primary School, Royton & Crompton School.

- We are looking at upgrading the lights on the Big Lamp Roundabout, so we can celebrate the nation's saints and other events like Holocaust Memorial Day and St David's Day.
- I have also made sure that Crompton ward puts in bids to the new Local Improvement Fund. This is the fund where wards can bid in for large projects rather than have their own funds. We were unsuccessful this year but we will try again in the next round.

As a Crompton Councillor I am proud to represent this lovely part of Oldham and I continue to work hard, all year round.

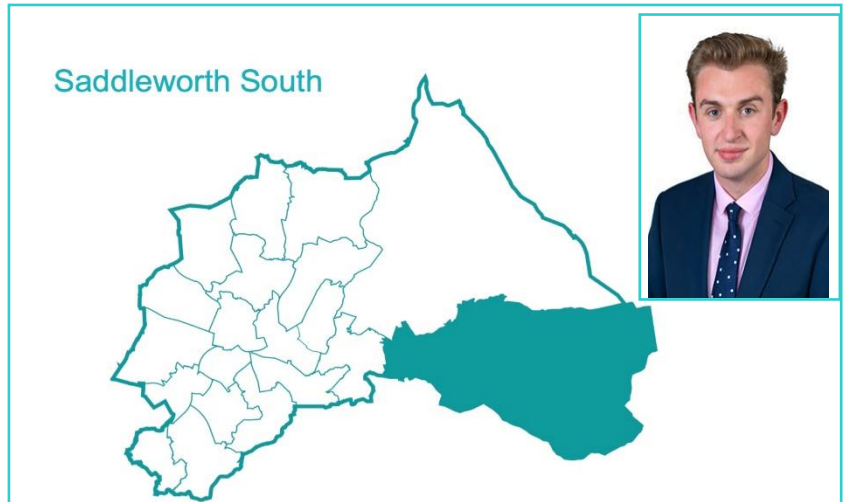

Work in the community

Footpaths:

- Bridge-Spring Street - we have worked with residents, Ramblers and the PRow Officer to get that open, we've paid for it to be resurfaced and have drainage works, we've had safety fencing erected to stop people falling over the edge.
- Well-i-Hole - after it was vandalised we had it cordoned off and reconstructed as a matter of urgency, after many months we've had the padlock cut off so the gate opens and enforcement action taken against the illegal activity.
- This is thematic across the Ward and we continue to work closely with Highways regarding missing signs and blocked FPs to avoid losing them altogether.
- Liaising with the Group Solicitor to have a Creation Order written for a Public Right of Way from Dobcross to Uppermill following the lines of the old footpath past Brownhill and Mytholm Mill.

Local Improvement Fund:

- I was a Member of the Advisory Panel and managed to secure the full funding for renovations to Lydgate Village Hall and reconstructing Friezland Arena working closely with the Applicants and signing the Applications off.

Bridleway:

- There is scaffolding up on the Carr Lane bridge over the Bridleway as it is pointed and maintenance works are completed to ensure it is safe. I've seen more detail of that in this month's newspaper, but my colleague Cllr Sheldon has been asking for over a year now.

Bins:

- Councillors Curley, Sheldon & I were consulted by Environmental Services on the placement of litter bins across the Ward and we have secured recycling provisions at Dove Stone, plus strategically placed bins at the ends of the Bridleway.
- They cannot be on the Bridleway because there has to be access for collection vehicles.

- After asking for bigger and better bins for years I dare say we consider this securing of bins to be a success, even if we had to wait for it.

Remembrance:

- My colleague Cllr Lancaster & I have successfully got the Parish Council to sign up to the Covenant to support our Armed Forces community in Saddleworth with employment opportunities and in other ways. We worked with the Ministry of Defence to do this.
- I have supported our Royal British Legion Branch with their activities and events and continue to do so as a Branch Member.
- I represented the Metropolitan Borough and Mayor of Oldham at Pots & Pans in November, as well as attending many other Remembrance services across the Ward.
- At my request a report and plan is being produced by OMBC Operations to look at repairing and maintaining Pots & Pans which is looking tired.

Special Projects:

Through our Councillor Budgets we have -

- Funded structural works at St. Anne's Church, Lydgate.
- Sponsored / paid for a competition of Saddleworth pubs with the White Hart and Cross Keys winning categories in this Ward.
- Funded flowers and planting across Saddleworth.
- Put Poppies on lampposts across Saddleworth, with at least some in every village.
- Supported our Brass Bands in Greenfield to go to Ypres (which they're doing this year to play at the Menin Gate) and Uppermill (who competed in National Championships).
- Sponsored a Youth Team at Saddleworth Rangers.
- Donated to erect a Royal British Legion sign at the Uppermill Conservative Club to help them recruit Members.
- Supported Yorkshire Day, and other traditions ensuring they can go ahead annually.
- Funded Christmas trees and decorations in Uppermill, Lydgate and Greenfield plus other villages in North & West Saddleworth.

Flowers:

- I did manage to have the flowers planted up on Lovers Lane in the Summer, as an addition to the Environmental services OMBC had planned.

Planning:

- As a Member of OMBC's Planning Committee I have considered many Applications both speaking and voting against those which are on Green Belt or OPOL or those which are unsuitable for Saddleworth for other reasons like Highway's safety.
- A notable example is the 77 dwellings in Diggle.
- I have also had to work closely with Planning Enforcement, the Head of Planning, Licensing, Environmental Health et cetera on many occasions to deal with illegal or inappropriate activity by individuals who don't think the law applies to them.

Platinum Jubilee:

- I am now actively organising a number of events to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee in June including a beacon lighting ceremony on Yarns Hill to which you are all welcome to attend.
- There are other projects in the pipeline for this which I shouldn't discuss publicly yet.

Highways:

- In addition to footpaths and bridleways I also spend a lot of time considering our roads and road safety. And I'm a Member of the TRO Panel so can see what is coming through in Saddleworth.
- I've managed to get two TROs planned 1) on Ladhill Lane, to stop parking which makes the already narrow bridge narrower 2) on Shaw Hall Bank Road where we are also introducing a prohibition of parking - this is not the best but it is the least worst option.
- We've worked to introduce schemes, like that at the Chapel Road / Oldham Road junction securing the crossing there.
- We've also secured a crossing outside St. Mary's School where the Road has been widened.
- Some of these schemes have been given Road Safety Awards too which is nice, it's always beneficial for us to comment and amend Highways' plans because in principle they're perfect but in practice not so.

Heritage and culture:

- I have continued to work with Highways to have the historic Victorian milestones maintained and the Director of Economy has supposedly found some funds in her Corporate Landlord Budget, but I've not seen this money yet.
- I have had one milestone moved to the Museum to form a 'Transport through Time' display (hopefully) after it was involved in a vehicular accident and was removed from site.
- I've also worked with the School and Museum to place a plaque for Dr Albert B. Wood - the Saddleworth physicist.
- I am exploring options for continuing to celebrate Saddleworth's Yorkshire identity too with the surviving White Rose Society (which is largely defunct) and we've had our first new signpost erected at Scouthead.
- I designed it and it is based on those erected by the West Riding County Council.
- I have no progress on BT Boxes because of stubborn Parish Council colleagues on the Estates Committee but I'll keep trying to persuade them.
- I have other heritage projects but not in my PMBC Ward - in my SPC Ward which won't be of much interest to you.
- On the Riverside FP a feature has been made of an old Corporation Board boundary stone (again at my request as it had sunk into the mud) - it now looks prominent and splendid.
- I'm also continuing to support the Historical Society with their project to create a Library, Archive and Local Studies at Holly Bank.
- Added a number of historically and architecturally significant buildings to the Local List for Greater Manchester including Friezland and Uppermill Schools, Lydgate Village Hall, Civic Hall, and Greenfield Conservative Club.

Environment:

- I am also working to get a site in Friezland designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest.
- Approved fungi growing on OMBC land to be sent to Kew Gardens for testing - we await the results of the tests (it could just be magic mushrooms).
- Found Incredible Edibles a base at Brownhill Gardens where they can utilise the raised beds for planting vegetables, herbs and fruit et cetera. Also they'll benefit from the wildlife in that area.
- I have had Pickhill Pond excluded from the old School site so it won't be sold, I have also asked that the playing fields and sport pitches are kept in place too for Teams and Clubs to use.

These are just some of the examples which stood out to me when I was writing this Report for you and this is in addition to the more minor or insignificant casework I get and deal with on a daily basis - like potholes, blocked gullies, road sweeping etc.
