### **LICENSING PANEL - ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS**

The procedure outlined below, which was enclosed with the notice of hearing sent to each party, and a copy of which is before you today, will be followed.

Documentary evidence may be relied upon and considered by the Panel if it has been served on the Licensing Authority prior to the hearing, or if all parties consent it can be produced on the day of the hearing.

Any person wishing to call a witness to speak at the hearing must have applied in writing for permission from the Licensing Authority at least 2 working days before the hearing and must also have provided the name of the witness and a brief description of the points on which that person may be able to assist the authority in relation to their application, representations or notice. Any application to call a witness where the party has not given 2 working days' notice will be considered by the Panel at the beginning of the hearing and permission will not be unreasonably withheld.

Each party will have the same amount of time in which to address the Panel, each party will have up to 60 minutes to address the authority and give any further information (which must be relevant to that party's or another party's application or representation). Where any party considers this time to be insufficient then, a request in writing may be made to the Constitutional Services Officer for an extension of time at least two working days before the hearing; however this will not automatically be granted, and will be at the discretion of the Panel.

Any person behaving in a disruptive manner will be asked to leave the hearing, however, if this occurs that person will be entitled to submit in writing any information they would have been entitled to give orally.

The Authority will provide a record of the hearing in a permanent and intelligible form and keep it for 6 years from the date of determination or disposal of any Appeal.

Members are advised that they are making decisions in a quasi-judicial manner. As such, they have a duty to view all evidence presented before them impartially. Members must disregard any information given by a party which is not relevant to the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Panel is not bound by the formal rules of evidence. Nevertheless, Members must carry out their duty placing what weight they feel is appropriate given the nature of the evidence and the manner in which it was obtained, and communicated.

### ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS

### INTRODUCTION

The Constitutional Services Officer ("the Clerk") will welcome those present and outline the procedure to be followed (as set out below) and record those present. The Clerk will remind everyone that each party will have up to 60 minutes to address the Panel and give any further information.

### **APPLICATION**

The Licensing Officer will outline the nature of the application.

The applicant and/or their representative to address the Panel, present additional information in support of the application (where consent to do so has been granted) and call any witnesses (subject to having given the required prior notice or having received permission at the beginning of the hearing). The Applicant and any witnesses may be questioned by Members of the Panel.

Any party, if given permission by the panel, may question the applicant and his witnesses, but this shall not take the form of cross examination.

### **REPRESENTATIONS**

The Party making the representation and/or their representative to address the members of the Panel, providing any additional information in support of their representation (where consent to do so has been granted) and call any witnesses (subject to having given the required prior notice or having received permission at the beginning of the hearing). The party and any witnesses may be questioned by Members of the Panel.

In the event that a number of members of the public are present at the meeting who intend to make a representation in relation to the application as interested parties then the Chair has discretion to ask that they appoint a nominated spokesperson to present their representations.

Any party, if given permission by the panel, may question the party making representations and his witnesses, but this shall not take the form of cross examination.

These representations will be taken in the following order: -

- Police Representation (unless they are the applicant)
- Licensing Authority
- Environmental Health Representation
- Other Responsible Authorities Representation
- Public Representation (Interested Parties)

### **CLOSING STATEMENTS**

The party making the representation may summarise their representation and make a closing statement.

The holder of the premises licence may summarise their representation and make a closing statement.

The Applicant may summarise the application and make a closing statement.

### **DETERMINATION**

The Panel Members will leave the hearing to consider their decision in private. The panels may request the services of a legal representative and Constitutional Services Officer.

Pursuant to Section 53C of the Licensing Act 2003, the purpose of this report is to ask Members to review the premises licence in respect of Sunny News & Off Licence, 4 Oxford Street, Oldham, OL9 7SN following an application for review of those premises made by Oldham Council Trading Standards.

### Licensing Panel – 12<sup>th</sup> October 2021

Review of Premises Licence following Review Notice Sunny News & Off Licence, 4 Oxford Street, Oldham, OL9 7SN

### 1. Purpose of Report

1.1 Pursuant to Section 53C of the Licensing Act 2003, the purpose of this report is to ask Members to review the premises licence in respect of Sunny News & Off Licence, 4 Oxford Street, Oldham, OL9 7SN following an application for review of those premises made by Oldham Council Trading Standard.

### 2. The Premises

- 2.1 Sunny News & Off Licence is located at 4 Oxford Street, Oldham, OL9 7SN. The Premises Licence Holder (PLH) and Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) is Mr Riaz Ahmed.
- 2.2 A location map is attached at Appendix 1.
- 2.3 A copy of the existing premises licence is attached at **Appendix 2.**

### 3. The Application

- 3.1 On 23<sup>rd</sup> July 2021 the applicant, Oldham Council Trading Standards, applied for a review of the premises licence for Sunny Off Licence. A copy of the application is attached at **Appendix 3.** The last date for representations in relation to this application was 20<sup>th</sup> August 2021.
- 3.2 The review was lodged on the following grounds:

Prevention of Crime & Disorder Public Safety; and, Protection of Children from Harm

- 3.3 In summary Trading Standards have found illicit tobacco and single cigarettes being sold on several occasions from this premises following complaints being received. The most recent occasion being the 20<sup>th</sup> February 2021 and dating back to the 8<sup>th</sup> April 2014. During this period illicit and counterfeit tobacco has been found on six occasions.
- 3.4 Following the seizure of illicit and counterfeit tobacco from the premises on the 8<sup>th</sup> April 2014 the premises were issued with a letter which was acknowledged and signed by the PLH and DPS. Since this, illicit and counterfeit tobacco has been found on a further five occasions. On the 31<sup>st</sup> October 2019 and the 16<sup>th</sup> January 2021 letters were sent to the premises notifying them of recent complaints, however, no response was received.
- 3.5 Full details of the complaints and visits to the premises are included in the Review Application attached at **Appendix 3**.
- 3.6 As part of the review, Trading Standards are seeking revocation of the premises licence.

### 4. Representations

4.1 No representations have been received for this application

### 5. Licensing Policy

- 5.1 Members considering this application should take note of the Authority's Licensing Policy ouncil Statement. Attention should be drawn to Section 6 Crime & Disorder, Section 7 Public Safety and Section 9 Protection of Children from Harm.
- 5.2 A full copy of the Councils Licensing Policy Statement will be available at the hearing.

### 6. Secretary of State's Guidance

- 6.1 Members also need to consider statutory guidance issued by the Secretary of State under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 6.2 Chapter 11 of the guidance deals with reviews. Members attention is drawn to paragraphs 11.17 to 11.20 which provide:
  - 11.17 The licensing authority may decide that the review does not require it to take any further steps appropriate to promoting the licensing objectives. In addition, there is nothing to prevent a licensing authority issuing an informal warning to the licence holder and/or to recommend improvement within a particular period of time. It is expected that licensing authorities will regard such informal warnings as an important mechanism for ensuring that the licensing objectives are effectively promoted and that warnings should be issued in writing to the licence holder.
  - 11.18 However, where responsible authorities such as the police or environmental health officers have already issued warnings requiring improvement either orally or in writing that have failed as part of their own stepped approach to address concerns, licensing authorities should not merely repeat that approach and should take this into account when considering what further action is appropriate.
  - 11.19 Where the licensing authority considers that action under its statutory powers is appropriate, it may take any of the following steps:
    - a. modify the conditions of the premises licence (which includes adding new conditions or any alteration or omission of an existing condition), for example, by reducing the hours of opening or by requiring door supervisors at particular times:
    - exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence, for example, to exclude the performance of live music or playing of recorded music (where it is not within the incidental live and recorded music exemption)10;
    - c. remove the designated premises supervisor, for example, because they consider that the problems are the result of poor management;
    - d. suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months:
    - e. revoke the licence.
  - 11.20 In deciding which of these powers to invoke, it is expected that licensing authorities should so far as possible seek to establish the cause or causes of the concerns that the representations identify. The remedial action taken should generally be directed at these causes and should always be no more than an appropriate and proportionate response to address the causes of concern that instigated the review.
- 6.3 Sections 11.24 to 11.28 cover reviews arising in connection with crime and members attention is drawn to this area and specifically paragraph 11.27 and 11.28 which provide:

- 11.27 There is certain activity that may arise in connection with licensed premises which should be treated particularly seriously. These are the use of the licensed premises...for the sale or storage of smuggled tobacco and alcohol.
- Oldham Council
- 11.28 It is envisaged that licensing authorities, the police, the Home Office (Immigration Enforcement) and other law enforcement agencies, which are responsible authorities, will use the review procedures effectively to deter any such activities and crime. Where reviews arise and the licensing authority determines that the crime prevention objective is being undermined through the premises being used to further crimes, it is expected that revocation of the licence even in the first instance should be seriously considered.
- 6.4 A full copy of the guidelines will be available at the hearing.

### 7. Options

- 7.1 When determining the application Members may take such steps as they consider appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps available to Members are:
  - a. To modify the conditions of the licence
  - b. To exclude a licensable activity
  - c. To remove the designated premises supervisor
  - d. To suspend the premises licence for a period not exceeding 3 months; or
  - e. To revoke the licence
- 7.2 Any steps appropriate to promote the licensing objectives should be specified. If none of the steps are appropriate and proportionate, no action should be taken.
- 7.3 In arriving at a decision Members must have regard to the relevant provisions of national guidance and the licensing policy statement and reasons must be given for any departure. The decision should be based on the individual merits of the application.

### 8. Consultation

8.1 Consultation in accordance with the Act has taken place with all responsible bodies and notice has been given to allow for any representations from interested parties.

### 9. Legal Services Comments

9.1 In determining the application Members should have regard to the Authority's licensing policy statement and the Secretary of State's Guidance referred to in paragraph 7. The chief officer of police for the police area in which the premises are situated, the holder of the premises licence or any other person who made relevant representations in relation to the application for the review have a right of appeal to the Magistrates' court within the period of 21 days beginning with the day on which the appellant was notified by the licensing authority of the decision appealed against. 

### **Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions**

- 19 Mandatory conditions where licence authorises supply of alcohol
- (1) Where a premise licence authorises the supply of alcohol, the licence must include the following conditions.
  - (2) The first condition is that no supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence -
- (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
  - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- (3) The second condition is that every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

### **ADDITIONAL MANDATORY CONDITIONS**

- 1. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol
  - (2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark

### **Annex 4 - Embedded Conditions**

#### S.164 LA 1964

### Off-licence

Alcohol shall not be sold in an open container or be consumed in the licensed premises.

### Off-licences and off-sales departments of on-licensed

- a. On weekdays, other than Christmas Day, 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. premises
- b. On Sundays, other than Christmas Day, 10 a.m. to 10.30 p.m.
- c. On Christmas Day, 12 noon to 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. to 10.30 p.m.
- d. On Good Friday, 8 a.m. to 10.30 p.m.

The above restrictions do not prohibit:

- (a) during the first twenty minutes after the above hours, the taking of the alcohol from the premises, unless the alcohol is supplied or taken in an open vessel;
- (b) the ordering of alcohol to be consumed off the premises, or the despatch by the vendor of the alcohol so ordered:
- (c) the sale of alcohol to a trader or club for the purposes of the trade or club;
- (d) the sale or supply of alcohol to any canteen or mess, being a canteen in which the sale or supply of alcohol is carried out under the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces.

### S.166 LA 1964 Licensed premises

- Alcohol shall not be sold or supplied unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is sold or supplied, except alcohol sold or supplied:

- (b) for consumption by a person residing in the premises or his guest and paid for together with his accommodation;
- (c) to a canteen or mess.

### Please state the ground(s) for review (please read guidance note 2)

- In response to complaints received about illegal and single cigarettes being sold from these licensed premises trading standards have found and seized counterfeit and illicit tobacco on four occasions since 2014.
- This illegal tobacco was found on the premises despite Mr Riaz AHMED (premises licence holder and designated premises supervisor) previously being issued with warning letters by trading standards in 2014 and also again 2019.
- A warning had also been issued to Mr Mohammed ALAM (a purported owner of the business) in 2019.
- The illegal tobacco was found under the counter as opposed to being within the shop's visible tobacco gantry which stocks genuine cigarettes. On one occasion illegal tobacco was observed being hidden at the rear of Mr ALAM's residential address located on the same street as the shop. This occurred while searches were being executed simultaneously at both locations and the tobacco was subsequently seized.
- On several occasions opened cigarettes packets were found under the shop counter which
  indicates that cigarettes were being sold as singles from the premises as alleged in some of
  the complaint received by this department.

### PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

We believe that this review application relates to the licensing objective of **prevention of crime and disorder** because it is a criminal offence to sell or offer for sale cigarettes which are counterfeit or illicit. It is also a criminal offence to split cigarette packs and sell cigarettes as 'singles'

s.92 Trade Marks Act 1994 makes it a criminal offence to expose for sale or possess for supply counterfeit cigarettes and tobacco products which bear a sign identical to or likely to be mistaken for a registered trade mark. For illicit (smuggled) tobacco it is a criminal offence under The Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015 to offer or possess for supply sale tobacco products which do not bear the standardised packaging and graphic health warnings in English. Illicit tobacco does not comply with these labelling or health warning requirements. It is also a criminal offence under these same Regulations to split and sell cigarette packets or to sell cigarettes as 'singles'. Finally it is also a criminal offence under s.144 Licensing Act 2003 for the premises licence holder or DPS to knowingly keep or allow to be kept, on any relevant premises, any goods which have been imported without payment of duty or which have otherwise been unlawfully imported. Such goods would include illicit cigarettes as these products are not intended for sale in the UK and duty has not been paid.

The illegal cigarettes found at the premises were seized under this criminal trade marks and standardised packaging legislation on all four occasions. Given the recurring pattern of complaints from members of the public against the premises and the subsequent seizures by trading standards officers of illicit and counterfeit tobacco we have concerns that the illegal sales of these products are a core activity of this business.

The warnings and advice issued to both Mr AHMED and Mr ALAM does not appear to have stopped these repeated occurrences. Moreover, the fact that these products were found under the counter and in one instance were observed being deposited outside from the back of an associated residential address while searches were being conducted suggests that attempts are being made to avoid this criminal activity being detected.

### PUBLIC SAFETY AND THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

We believe that this review also relates to the licensing objective of **public safety** and **the protection of children from harm**.

The World Health Organisation has identified the illicit trade in tobacco products to be a serious threat to public health. In its *Protocol to Eliminate Illicit Trade in Tobacco Products* (ratified by the UK Government in June 2018) it states that the illicit trade in tobacco products, 'poses a serious threat to public health. Illicit trade increases the accessibility and affordability of tobacco products, thus fuelling the tobacco epidemic and undermining tobacco control policies.'

Oldham trading standards have received complaints of underage tobacco sales and cigarettes being sold singly from the premises as outlined in the supporting information. Searches at the premises have identified opened packets of illegal tobacco underneath the shop counter on several occasions. Illegal tobacco products are sold at a cheaper price than legitimate tobacco making them more affordable to children. They are even more affordable when packets of cigarettes are split and sold as singles. A survey of 14-17 year olds commission by Trading Standards North West found that 14% of the 14-17 years surveyed in the North West said that they had purchased illegal cigarettes within the last 12 months. 66% of these illegal cigarettes were purchased from shops.

Since 2017 all cigarettes and hand rolling tobacco sold in the UK must be contained within standardised packaging with graphic warnings and images. Some of the objectives of these standardised packaging being brought in as law were;

- discouraging people from starting to use tobacco products
- encouraging people to give up using tobacco products

- reducing potential for packaging to detract from the effectiveness of health warnings.<sup>2</sup>

However, illicit and counterfeit cigarettes such as those found at Sunny Newsagents do not comply with these requirements and have branded packaging meaning that any health warnings are less prominent and serve to undermine these objectives.

Based on the grounds outlined above and the repeated criminal offences detected at the shop we are seeking a review of its premises licence We would respectfully ask the panel to consider revocation of the premises licence on the following grounds;

- we have concerns that removal of the DPS would not address the issues given that our enforcement activities have identified that the other operators associated with the business (including the owner, Mr Alam and his wife) are also both involved in this illegal activity. As a result it is unclear whether there is anyone with sufficient control of the business, who could take on this role with sufficient assurance that this criminal activity would cease
- we are also not confident that a temporary suspension would address the issues given that despite both Mr Riaz as DPS/PLH and Mr Alam having opportunity over a number of years to act on the comprehensive advice and warnings provided to them, illegal tobacco has continued to be seized throughout this period.
- Finally, the repeated discovery of illegal tobacco under the shop counter despite our seizures and warnings suggests that it is the intention of the business operators to habitually engage in this illegal activity which brings into doubt their suitability to adhere to the licensing objectives

Details of the complaints, seizure and actions taken against the premises to date can be found in the following supporting information section.

According to departmental records 10 complaints have been received since 2014 which relate to the sale of illicit illegal tobacco from the premises and/or underage sales. The nature of the allegations are as follows

January 2021 Illegal tobacco being sold and underage sales of tobacco to children

August 2019 Underage sales of cheap tobacco

August 2019 Counterfeit cigarettes being sold

July 2019 Counterfeit cigarettes being sold from under the counter

April 2019 Counterfeit cigarettes sales

March 2019 Counterfeit and single cigarette sales

March 2019 Sales of counterfeit cigarettes

January 2019 Counterfeit cigarettes being sold

August 2015 Sales of foreign imported cigarettes – customers asked to hide them before leaving the shop.

February 2014 Illicit tobacco being sold from the premises

On 8<sup>th</sup> April 2014 Mr AHMED (Premises Licence Holder and Designated Premises Supervisor). was issued with a warning in relation to a seizure illicit and counterfeit tobacco from his premises. That seizure comprised of 60 x cigarettes & 100g of hand rolling tobacco which were all counterfeit. On 17<sup>th</sup> April Mr Ahmed signed an acknowledgement in the presence of a trading standards officer to confirm that he had received the letter and agreed to comply with the requirements and advice it

provided. Mr Ahmed at the time also signed a voluntary forfeiture for the seized illicit and counterfeit cigarettes so that Oldham trading standards could securely destroy them.

# However, since Mr Ahmed received this warning illegal tobacco products have been recovered from the trading standards on the following occasions;

- 1. On **24**<sup>th</sup> **June 2019** in response to allegations of counterfeit and illicit tobacco the premises were searched and 180 Richmond cigarettes (counterfeit) were found under the counter along with two opened packets. Mr Mohammed ALAM was present.
- 2. On 9th October 2019 in response to allegations of sales of illicit tobacco, single cigarettes and sales to persons under the age of 18 the premises was searched and an opened packet containing 3 x illicit 'Heritage Premium' cigarettes was found under the shop counter. Mr AHMED the licence holder was present at the time. While a search of the shop was taking place an entry warrant was simultaneously executed at a nearby residential address on the same street used by both Mr ALAM and Mr AHMED. A police officer stationed at the rear of the property observed an Asian female remove a box and place it outside an external toilet at the rear before she opened the front door so that the search could commence. The box was recovered and found to contain 400 x illicit cigarettes of the same brand as found within the shop premises and the Asian female was identified to be Ms Nasreen AKHTAR, Mr ALAM's wife. Mr AHMED also subsequently attended the residential premises. Warning letters in relation to these seizures were issued to Mr AHMED, Mr ALAM and Ms AKHTAR.
- 3. On **31**<sup>st</sup> **October 2019** a letter was sent to Mr ALAM at the premises notifying him that trading standards had received allegations of underage sales taking place at the premises. We have no record of any response being received.
- 4. On 15th January 2020 40 x assorted cigarettes comprising of 4 x opened packets of various brands were found under the shop counter and a further 140 x Richmond cigarettes were found concealed within a coat pocket behind the same counter. The sole employee present at the premises claimed that it was his first day and he had not been trained because he was just covering for the owner. The employee did not know whether there was an underage sales refusals book on the premises. MR RIAZ was (and still is) the licence holder for the shop. However, Mr ALAM attended a recorded interview and stated that he had been involved with the shop since 2014 and was now the sole director of the business. Mr ALAM signed to confirm that he had received written advice about the criminal offences relating to the sale of illegal tobacco. Mr ALAM attempted to claim that the tobacco found under the shop counter was for 'personal use' by his staff. Following interview he was given comprehensive written advice during a meeting with a trading standards officer recommending that he provide lockers for staff personal property so that no illegal tobacco would be found within the shop floor or counter area in the future.
- 5. On **16<sup>th</sup> January 2021** a letter was sent to the premises raising allegations of underage sales taking place and notifying the business that trading standards will be conducting test purchases. We have no record of any response being received.
- 6. On 11<sup>th</sup> February 2021 200 x counterfeit Richmond Cigarettes were purchased from the premises during an undercover test purchasing operation arranged by trading standards. In that instance the cigarettes were obtained from the back room of the premises by the staff member
- 7. Nine days later on 20<sup>th</sup> February 2021 Mr ALAM himself was in attendance at the premises when 180 Richmond Cigarettes were found in a bag under the shop counter and seized from the premises. This recurrence suggests that the advice given to Mr ALAM the previous year to provide staff with lockers for their tobacco for 'personal' use' had not been followed.



- 5.2 A full copy of the Councils Licensing Policy Statement will be available at the hearing.

### 6. Secretary of State's Guidance

A condition of this kind may only be justified as appropriate in rare circumstances where it can be demonstrated that, in the circumstances associated with particular premises, poor management competency could give rise to issues of crime & disorder and public safety.

6.4 A full copy of the guidelines will be available at the hearing.

### 7. Options

- 7.1 When determining the application Members, having had regard to the representations, may take such steps as they consider appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps available to Members are:
  - a. Grant the application as applied for with or without the amendments agreed with Environmental Health
  - b. Grant the application but modify the operating schedule in relation to hours, days, conditions, or activities
  - c. Reject the application





#### The Prevention of Crime & Disorder

Please state the reasons you believe granting the application will undermine this objective

Trading standards have had previous recent dealings with this premises and Mr MOHAMMED in relation to the supply and possession of illicit and counterfeit tobacco products.

- In response to complaints received about illegal and single cigarettes being sold from these premises, trading standards conducted a search on 19<sup>th</sup> September 2020 and seized a substantial quantity of counterfeit and illicit tobacco.
- This illegal tobacco seizure comprised 22,557 cigarettes, which were found within the shop's cellar, a holdall behind the counter as well as also being concealed behind the counter within 2 jackets which had sleeves that had been especially modified for this purpose.
- 99x packets of prescription only and foreign labelled medicines (antibiotics and painkillers) were also found during the search. Details were referred to the Medicines and Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) as such products fall within their remit and cannot legally be sold within the UK.
- During interviews under caution in November 2020 (with an interpreter present) Mr MOHAMMED admitted that the cigarettes were his and he had purchased them to sell.
- Mr MOHAMMED has previously been interviewed regarding similar criminal offences in July 2017, involving a lockup storage unit, which he was at the time renting that was found to contain over half a million (561,892) illegal illicit cigarettes and 19.75kg of illicit hand rolling tobacco. Antibiotic and painkiller medicines of types similar to those recovered from Timisoara were also found on that occasion at this storage unit. In that instance Mr MOHAMMED had been given a written warning and detailed advice concerning the illegal tobacco and potential criminal offences for which he had signed to confirm receipt.
- Although that warning and advice had been issued to MR MOHAMMED before he
  took over ownership of Timisoara, it does not appear to have stopped this
  occurrence within the licensed premises. Moreover, the fact that these products
  were found under the shop counter and concealed within modified jackets suggest
  that attempts are being made to avoid this criminal activity being detected.

At that time of the seizure from the Timisoara the premises was operating under another alcohol premises licence (PL0956) held by Mr Haval AMIN. Comments made by Mr MOHAMMED under caution (with an interpreter present) in several recorded interviews in November 2020 indicated that Mr AMIN, despite still being the premises licence holder at that time, was no longer involved with the business following its sale to Mr MOHAMMED earlier last year several months prior to our seizure from the premises. **EXTRACTS FROM THE INTERVIEW TRANSCRIPT ARE CONTAINED AT THE BOTTOM OF THIS SECTION.** 

Trading Standards then proceeded with an application to review the premises licence for Timisoara which was in place at the time. However, since that application was submitted the previous licence has been surrendered prior to the hearing and Mr MOHAMMED has

now elected to make a new application. Given that our investigations and actions in relation to the illegal cigarettes have identified Mr MOHAMMED as the owner of the premises and, by his own admission, the owner of the cigarettes for the purposes of the selling of them, the grounds for our objection remain unchanged.

We therefore believe that this granting this application undermines the licensing objective of **prevention of crime and disorder** because it is a criminal offence to sell or offer for sale cigarettes which are counterfeit or illicit. It is also a criminal offence to split cigarette packs and sell cigarettes as 'singles'.

s.92 **Trade Marks Act 1994** makes it a criminal offence to expose for sale or possess for supply counterfeit cigarettes and tobacco products which bear a sign identical to or likely to be mistaken for a registered trade mark. For illicit (smuggled) tobacco it is a criminal offence under **The Standardised Packaging of Tobacco Products Regulations 2015** to offer or possess for supply sale tobacco products which do not bear the standardised packaging and graphic health warnings in English. Illicit tobacco does not comply with these labelling or health warning requirements. It is also a criminal offence under these same Regulations to split and sell cigarette packets or to sell cigarettes as 'singles'. Further, it is also a criminal offence under s.144 **Licensing Act 2003** for the premises licence holder or DPS to knowingly keep or allow to be kept, on any relevant premises, any goods which have been imported without payment of duty or which have otherwise been unlawfully imported. Such goods would include illicit cigarettes as these products are not intended for sale in the UK and duty has not been paid.

The illegal cigarettes found at the premises were seized under this criminal trade marks and standardised packaging legislation.

A substantial quantity of illegal tobacco was found within these premises and some of it had been concealed which suggests an attempt to avoid detection. Mr MOHAMMED admitted in interview that he intended to sell these products without checking their legality despite being interviewed by trading standards and receiving a warning the previous year in relation to these same illicit products and potential criminal offences at another premises. This recurrence at Timisoara suggests a propensity to engage in this illegal activity which brings into doubt the suitability of the business to adhere to the licensing objectives. Our department has concerns regarding the issuing of a licence to the applicant given that his apparent disregard for the legislation relating to tobacco products might equally apply to alcohol sales.

Trading standards are currently proceeding with a prosecution against Mr MOHAMMED in relation to the illegal tobacco seizure made from Timisoara. If that prosecution is successful we will be requesting that the court revokes his personal licence given that he would then have been found guilty of committing relevant offences under the Licensing Act.

## A timeline summary of our dealings with Mr MOHAMMED and the premises by the trading standards department is summarised below;

According to departmental records 5 complaints have been received against Timisoara since 2019 which relate to the sale of illicit/illegal tobacco/single cigarettes from the premises and/or underage sales. The nature of the allegations are as follows:

November 2020	Allegation of underage sales and single cigarettes being sold from the premises
July 2020	Allegation of sale of duty-free cigs from the premises

	Allegation of illicit tobacco being sold

On 16<sup>th</sup> July 2019 Mr MOHAMMED had been issued with a warning letter in relation to the seizure of over half a million (561,892) illicit cigarettes on 15<sup>th</sup> July 2018 from premises that he was leasing at that time. Painkiller and antibiotic medicines were also found at the unit. The warning was issued following Mr MOHAMMED'S interview under caution in relation to this illicit tobacco and the potential criminal offences. The warning letter also contained information on the standardised packaging requirements for all cigarettes placed on sale in the UK. This included advising him of the requirement for all packaging to be in a standard drab green/brown colour. On 1<sup>st</sup> August 2019 trading standards received an acknowledgement slip from Mr MOHAMMED signed and dated 27/07/2019 to confirm that he had received this warning letter and agreed to comply with the requirements and advice it provided.

On 20<sup>th</sup> August 2019 Timisoara was visited in response to complaints being received alleging sales of illicit tobacco and notification from a brand-holder that had successfully obtained illicit cigarettes from the premises when making a test purchase. Although no illicit tobacco was found on the premises the person present in the shop at the time gave his details as Haval AMIN, the same name as the holder of the previous Premises licence at this shop.

On 19<sup>th</sup> September 2020, in response to a further complaint the premises was again visited and illegal tobacco was seized comprising 22,557 cigarettes, which were found within the shop's cellar, a holdall behind the counter as well as also being concealed behind the counter within 2 jackets which had sleeves that had been especially modified for this purpose. Please see APPENDIX ONE for a photo of the seized cigarettes. Mr Sardar MOHAMMED was behind the counter at the time of the search and in subsequent interviews under caution in November 2020 he admitted that he was the owner of the business and was intending to sell these cigarettes. He also admitted placing them inside the jackets behind his counter. He claimed not to know that the cigarettes were illegal despite them being foreign labelled and despite his previous warning and advice the previous year. During these same interviews he also made the following comments stating Mr AMIN, although at that time the licence holder and DPS for the licensed premises, was no longer involved in the business.

#### **Public Safety**

The World Health Organisation has identified the illicit trade in tobacco products to be a serious threat to public health. In its *Protocol to Eliminate Illicit Trade in Tobacco Products* (ratified by the UK Government in June 2018) it states that the illicit trade in tobacco products, 'poses a serious threat to public health. Illicit trade increases the accessibility and affordability of tobacco products, thus fuelling the tobacco epidemic and undermining tobacco control policies.'

Since 2017 all cigarettes and hand rolling tobacco sold in the UK must be contained within standardised packaging with graphic warnings and images. Some of the objectives of these standardised packaging being brought in as law were:

- discouraging people from starting to use tobacco products
- encouraging people to give up using tobacco products
- reducing potential for packaging to detract from the effectiveness of health warnings.<sup>2</sup>

However, illicit and counterfeit cigarettes such as those found at Timisoara do not comply with these requirements and have branded packaging meaning that any health warnings are less prominent and serve to undermine these objectives.

Oldham trading standards have received a complaint of underage tobacco sales and cigarettes being sold singly from the premises as outlined in the details within the previous sections. Illegal tobacco products are sold at a cheaper price than legitimate tobacco making them more affordable to children. They are even more affordable when packets of cigarettes are split and sold as singles. A survey of 14-17 year olds commissioned by Trading Standards North West found that 14% of the 14-17 years surveyed in the North West said that they had purchased illegal cigarettes within the last 12 months. 66% of these illegal cigarettes were purchased from shops.
