





Claimant Count figures have risen sharply because of UC Full-Service. The proportion of residents in receipt of out-of-work benefits has been increasing in Oldham, most likely because of the implementation of UC Full-Service in April 2017. However, ESA figures have now levelled off after previous sustained falls, and may be on the cusp of rising. Oldham has currently 282 families impacted by the benefit cap, 128 of those capped having large families with 4, 5 or more children.



The DWP have stopped delivering statistics for further sanctions breakdowns (such as sanctions severity level) for Full-Service claimants. Sanction numbers in Oldham are rising, yet the sanctions rate has dropped since UC Full-Service began.



The Welfare Rights team saw steady increases in enguiries over time, until a sudden increase with the introduction of Full Service in Oldham. Levels have since fallen, as would be expected during that one year implementation period. The Welfare Rights team has supported many residents to maximise their income. In 2018/19 a budget of £654,359 was made available for DHP applications, with the majority being allocated to subsidise households impacted by the 'size criteria' ('bedroom tax'). From April 2018, £120,000 was also allocated for LWP with 596 essential items (eg furniture, white goods) delivered. Use of food banks varies greatly by ward, with highest numbers of vouchers in the most deprived wards.
