Theme	Proposed Activity and Objectives
Early Years	Consolidation of the focus on home learning and providing more direct support for parents.
	Helping parents improve their home learning environment by developing a wide range of low cost and no cost local activities such as the Bradford 50 things to do before you're 5. This universal offer will align with the Oldham Strategy for Early Years – Priority 2: Improve children's health & development outcomes for babies, young children.
	Extending the Making it REAL home learning programme across the most disadvantaged wards. Whilst other supports such as mobile apps are helpful at a universal level/population level, the face-to-face link, existing relationships and trust mean that schools / settings / children's centres themselves in Oldham are well placed to support parents who need more support.
	Project 1: MIR Nursery Project Project 2: Play, grow and learn through Making it Real delivered through HomeStart Project 3: Making it REAL – Legacy and Networking.
	Early language & literacy development
	Delivery of a targeted Early Reading programme – focusing on the 30 schools who had low outcomes in reading in the Autumn 2020 term.
	Continuing to support Communication Champions drive forward practice in their settings around Speech, Language and Communication (SLC) through the Early Years Better Communication team.
	Increasing our focus on working with early years practitioners in settings and schools to support children's social and emotional development & mental wellbeing.
	Building on the work already started with the introduction of the Ferre Leavers - emotional well-being and involvement scales.
	Extending the use of the Solihull Approach beyond Right Start practitioners to increase emotional health and well-being through both practitioners and parents. This will be through a workforce development programme across the child and family workforce.
School standards and wellbeing	Embed Oldham Learning as the model for school improvement.
	We will support Oldham Learning to be the model of a sector-led approach to enable improved outcomes for children and young people in Oldham. Working closely with Oldham Learning and Oldham Council, we will support recovery for children and schools post-pandemic, and sustain and further develop improvements in outcomes, working collaboratively to support the system to give Oldham's children and young people a high-quality education and the best start in life.

	Further develop twinning opportunities with Tameside, with an initial focus on digital learning and Emotional Health and Mental Wellbeing.
	Introducing the early identification of Autism programme into Oldham. This programme will be developed in partnership with Bradford OA who have previously run the programme and a working group from Oldham Council.
