The Licensing Act 2003 Interested Party Representation Form



The Licensing Act 2003 (the act) makes local authorities responsible for the licensing of pubs, clubs, theatres, cinemas, restaurants, takeaways and so on. Some premises may apply to extend their hours or add some form of regulated entertainment and this is where interested parties can have their say by making relevant representations and objecting to the proposals.

Interested parties

An interested party is defined by the act as:

- An Elected Member
- A person living in the vicinity;
- A body representing persons living in the vicinity;
- · A person involved in business in the vicinity of the premises; or
- A body representing persons involved in such businesses.

The word "vicinity" has not been clearly defined by the act. If you are living or working close enough to a premises and you are to be affected by the activities, we will look at your location to determine if you can be described as 'in the vicinity'.

What are the objectives?

Representations can only be made on the grounds that there may be a breach of the licensing objectives in the act. These are:

- The prevention of crime and disorder; (Examples of representations relevant to this objective are illegal drugs, sex related activities, violent behaviour, anti-social behaviour, drunkenness, drug dealing, underage selling, and so on.)
- Public safety;

(Examples of representations relevant to this objective are breaches of health and safety laws, accommodation limits, first aid, unauthorised alterations to property and so on.)

- The prevention of public nuisance; and (Examples of representations relevant to this objective are noise nuisance, noxious smells, anti-social behaviour, litter in the vicinity and so on.)
- The protection of children from harm. (Examples of representations relevant to this objective are underage selling, sexual activities, access to premises, drugs use and so on.)

What are relevant representations?

"Relevant representations" is the term used in the act for comments including objections on applications, reviews etc.

For the purposes of making a representation by an interested party, a representation must be relevant. For a representation to be relevant it must:

- relate to the effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of the licensing objectives (stated as above);
- be made by an interested party or responsible authority;
- not have been withdrawn;
- not be 'frivolous' or 'vexatious' or, in the case of a review, 'repetitious' if made by an interested party.

Try to be as specific as possible and give examples e.g. on 1 February I could hear loud music from the premises between 10pm and 1 am. I am concerned that if the premises open until 2 am this will cause a public nuisance to me and other residents of the street.

To prevent crime and disorder	Please state your reasons: I have concerns regarding people entering and exiting the premises via Knoll Close. Drunk people will be walking through this quiet street where all there are lot's of young families. I am concerned that the people once intoxicated could damage property including vehicles and gardens. The amount of litter will increase on the back path and there is already a huge issue with this. Broken bottles will become an issue where children play and people walk their dogs. Wellington road and surrounding streets already have an issue with crowds gathering at night and damaging property and creating havoc, the opening of the brewery will only add to this.
Public safety	Please state your reasons: The back path where the entrance/exit is poorly lit and badly littered. There is also only a low (and broken) railing between the path and the river. This could be a hazard and potential threat to life when drunk people are leaving the premises via this path. Broken bottles could cause an injury to children/adults/animals.
To prevent public nuisance	Please state your reasons: This venue is located near several quiet residential streets where young children and elderly people reside. This is not a good place for live music and late night drinking. When the brewery was situated on Boarshurst Lane in generated numerous complaints from residents regarding noise from drunk people and children running around unattended whilst there parents were drinking in the brewery, I fail to see how moving the brewery to a more populated area is going to be any different. The licensing proposal is asking for events which will mean loud music, crowds of people and PA systems. This is unfair on local residents.
The protection of children from harm	Please state your reasons: A large number of children live on Knoll Close and Herons Reach. These children enjoy playing out on their bikes and playing ball games. The brewery will create footfall (drunk people) and traffic on our quiet streets thus endangering the children when they play. Consequently the children would not be able to play out and that is unfair, this is there home and they have had enough of being shut inside recently.
