Reason for the decision: Oldham Council has secured funding from the following source:

The purpose of this report is to confirm the value of the grant available to Oldham and to notify the Officer of the intention to bring this additional resource into the transport capital programme to

commence delivery of the schemes.

Summary: Oldham Council secured funding from the

Department for Transport, Active Travel Fund for £49,500 for the purpose of progressing four

School Streets schemes.

The 4 schemes will benefit 5 primary schools as follows:

- Hey with Zion and St. Edward's schools in Lees
- Christ Church in Chadderton
- Northmoor Academy in Coldhurst
- St. Anne's in Royton

These schools were selected because they met the criteria for this funding better than some other schools which we know have congestion issues. They are close to other complimentary schemes such as Mayor's Challenge Fund and other Active Travel Schemes. All the schools have committed to working in partnership and registering for Modeshift STARS the National Accreditation scheme for schools.

Oldham Council and Unity Partnership will work together to design and deliver the schemes by March 2022.

School Streets schemes aim to restrict the use of motorised traffic at key times of the school day to encourage parents to walk, cycle or scoot with their children to school for all or part of the journey. A School Street environment should aim to provide a safer environment in which to do this.

What are the alternative option(s) to be considered? Please give the reason(s) for recommendation(s):

There are two options:

Option 1: accept the grant offer and deliver the above schemes in an appropriate timescale.

Option 2: do not accept the grant offer and therefore do not deliver the above schemes.

Consultation:

Consultation between Oldham Council and Unity Partnership officers has taken place throughout development of the School Street application. This has also involved discussions with the schools in question to ensure their support and participation in the schemes.

Experimental Traffic Regulation Orders (TRO) and further consultation with the schools, parents, residents and businesses in the localities will take place as the schemes are developed.

The Portfolio Holder for Neighbourhood Services and Ward Councillors have been communicated with and will be kept informed and updated

The Transport Capital Programme is determined and approved centrally (involving Council and Unity officers at a senior level and the Portfolio Holder for Neighbourhood Services) so that schemes meet the Council's statutory duties and wider transport strategy objectives. In the light

of decreasing levels of funding, the development of the programme reflects a co-operative approach, ensuring that where possible schemes meet multiple objectives and complement other capital and revenue programmes such as regeneration. This approach can often result in composite schemes comprising carriageway maintenance, safety enhancements, public realm, pedestrian and cycle improvements, which achieves better value for money.
