	(a) Implement the defibrillator policy for utilising when applications are made for either funding an AED or for permissions to install in or on Council owned sites or buildings.

### Reason for the decision:

Oldham Council and Councillors receive requests from community groups on an ad hoc basis to consider whether funding applications could be supported for the purchase and installation of AEDs. In addition to this there are requests to install devices in Council owned buildings or on Council owned land. The requests are made through various channels such as to Councillors or direct to departments. In the past this has led to inconsistent with responses, some geographical having high areas а concentration of AEDs, and other areas a lower concentration. Should a community device be installed in a Council building or on a Council site and the community group disband, responsibility for regular maintenance checks and repairs may fall to the Council, which is not without cost or resource implication. There is also the potential for an increased risk of vandalism which the Council may not wish to accept relating to their building or site where an installed device is located.

The Council defibrillator policy has been approved the Management board 19<sup>th</sup> July 2023.

The preferred option is to approve the defibrillation Policy. The policy outlines the process for approving the installation of new AED's either in the community or on Council owed land and buildings.
Applications from community groups should be made via the District. Teams and

### 1. Background:

An Automated External Defibrillator (AED) is an essential part of the chain of survival during the response to sudden cardiac arrest, restoring a normal heart rhythm<sup>1</sup>. Defibrillators have the potential to save lives with some evidence showing that accessing devices within 3-5 minutes of a cardiac arrest increases the chance of survival by over 40%. An increase in the number of AEDs locally will give members of the community/community groups a safe, effective and prompt tool in the vital delivery of potential lifesaving treatment. Premature deaths from cardiovascular disease in Oldham is significantly higher than the England average. In 2021 Oldham had an under 75 mortality

rate from all cardiovascular diseases at 101.5 per 100,000, compared to England at 76 per 100,000<sup>1</sup>.

Oldham Council and Councillors receive requests from community groups on an ad hoc basis to consider whether funding applications could be supported for the purchase and installation of AEDs. In addition to this there are requests to install devices in Council owned buildings or on Council owned land. The requests are made through various channels such as to Councillors or direct to departments. In the past this has led to inconsistent responses, with some geographical areas having a high concentration of AEDs, and other areas a lower concentration. Should a community device be installed in a Council building or on a Council site and the community group disband, responsibility for regular maintenance checks and repairs may fall to the Council, which is not without cost or resource implication. There is also the potential for an increased risk of vandalism which the Council may not wish to accept relating to their building or site where an installed device is located.

The aims of the community defibrillator policy are:

- To provide evidence-based information on helping an individual suspected of having an out of hospital cardiac arrest;
- To promote national guidance regarding automated external defibrillators;
- To provide guidance with decision making when applications are made for funding to Council departments or individual Councillors;
- To set the parameters in which the Council would consider supporting installation of an AED on a Council owned building or site.

# 2. Current Position

- **2.1** The policy has been developed with colleagues from across Public Health, Policy, Districts team, Environmental Services and Facilities Management.
- **2.2** The Policy has been approved at the Council Management board on the 19<sup>th</sup> July 2023.
- **2.3**Using nationally available mapping tools, it is possible to conservatively estimate that Oldham has over 70 AEDs across the borough.

The AEDs are at a variety of public, private and community venues. There is no mapping tool that covers the entirety of the borough as a whole, this is because the tools are designed to locate AED within a close proximity during an emergency. Appendix A shows coverage in smaller geographical areas within Oldham. The mapping tools have limitations, and it is not always possible to differentiate between those available during business hours only and those accessible 24hours 7days a week.

- **2.4** Any AED on the outside of buildings or located in exposed areas such as parks have the advantage of being more accessible, but this is not without challenge, namely a greater risk of vandalism. There are costs associated with this. The risk of vandalism also increases the possibility that the device is not in full working order should it be needed in the event of an emergency.
- **2.5** The highest footfall and therefore increased likely hood of a cardiac arrest, is during site operating hours and not 'after hours'. Increasing AED provision in areas of low footfall and potentially higher rates of vandalism is not encouraged. It is also worth noting that some of the AEDs are portable, for example those belonging to sports clubs that may take their device to away games, therefore not accessible to the general public at all times but would serve the needs of a particular community.
- 2.6 In 2022, the government made an announcement of its intention to roll out AED across all state funded schools in England. On completion of this roll out, Oldham will have a much higher provision of AEDs in the borough, with good geographical coverage that may serve areas that currently have a lower concentration of AEDs. A slight caveat should be made that it is likely that these are only available during school operating hours.
- 2.7 The Council has no centrally allocated budget to financially support the purchase or installation of a community defibrillator. Should a Council department or Councillor feel there is strong justification and available budgetary provision the policy sets out a number of considerations before agreements should be made.

### 2.8 Next Steps

- To ensure that the policy is accessible to the public via the Council website.
- Cascade the policy to key stakeholders and implement with immediate effect.
- Share the policy with Action Together to consider wide application for assessing funding applications for AED and to support the approach for not over concentrating provision of AED in some areas whilst other areas remain under served.
