# Greater Manchester Combatting Drugs Partnership Delivery Plan Jan 2023 – March 2024

# Introduction

This first iteration of a GM Combatting Drugs Delivery Plan has been prepared for consideration by the GM Drug and Alcohol Transformation Board at its next meeting in February 2023. The Board fulfils the role of a Combating Drugs Partnership (CDP) for Greater Manchester responsible for local implementation of the National Drug Strategy.

The approved Delivery Plan will be made available to the national Joint Combatting Drugs Unit alongside other required documents, namely a GM Drug and Alcohol Strategic Outcomes Framework and a GM Joint Needs Assessment.

# 2. Local authority: Oldham agreed targets & measures

Local authority planning submissions to OHID include 6 measures intended to improve the delivery of substance misuse services. The measures, and where applicable targets, are shown below.

Local authorities have governance structures in place to manage treatment system development at a local level.

#### 2.1 Numbers in treatment

There is a central government ambition to increase the number of clients in treatment by 20% compared to the 2021/22 baseline. Table 1 shows the combined numbers in treatment baseline and planned increases from 2022 to 2025 for all the GM authorities. Table 2 shows the data by local authority area.

## 2.2 Reduce drug and alcohol deaths

There is a national ambition to reduce the annual number of drug and alcohol related deaths by 1,000 per year. This has not been translated into a numerical target at a local or regional level as numbers are very low and therefore small increases or decreases can have a significant impact. The GM aim is to reduce the overall number of drug and alcohol related deaths over the period of this Delivery Plan. Table 3 shows the recorded deaths in 2020 and deaths in treatment for 2020/21.

## 2.3 Workforce

Increasing the capacity and skill base of the treatment and commissioning workforce is critical to delivering improved and expanded services. There is no numerical target for increasing the workforce but Table 4 shows the proposed recruitment in 2022/23.

# 2.4 Continuity of Care

There is a national ambition for 75% of prison releases requiring substance misuse support to be transferred into community treatment within 3-weeks of release. Table 5 show the 2021/22 baseline and local area ambitions over three years. It is noted that not all local areas are indicating an intention to match the national ambition, the local targets take into account differing circumstances and have been signed off by OHID.
