1764

First water powered cotton mill in the world at Thorp Mill, Royton.

1840s

A few thousand people arrive from Ireland providing cheap labour.

1913

The peak year for the cotton industry. Oldham boasted more spindles than any town in the world.

1950s

First migrants from Mirpur in Pakistan young men to fill demand for cheap labour in the cotton mills.

1980s

End of large scale textile industry, recession begins with large scale job losses.

2001

Riots in Oldham. Unemployment rates are high amongst minority ethnic groups.

1800s

Oldham at the centre of a fast growing cotton industry. Most work is related to the cotton industry.

1861

Orange and Green riots Catholic churches attacked.

Late 1940s

Over 2000 former refugees (Poland, Ukraine and elsewhere settled in Oldham and worked in the mills.

1960s

Migrants continue to come from Pakistan and Sylhet in Bangladesh. Women also migrate to join the men.

199

The last cotton mill in Oldham, Elk Mill closed.

2011

High birth rates and continuing immigration take ethic minorities to 22.5% of Oldham's population.

- 3. STAKEHILL



Our future town centre



Our future town centre

We've partnered with Muse to develop 2,000 new homes across Oldham town centre. Together, we'll deliver homes of all types and sizes which will be built on pieces of land including Oldham Civic Centre – which is being freed up by staff moving into Spindles. The former leisure centre site and former Magistrates' Court site will also be redeveloped.

Five other possible sites across the town centre are also identified, including the Tommyfield Market site, which will relocate into the new-look Spindles, unlocking the land for development alongside a new town centre park.

Muse is an award-winning national placemaker, headed up by Phil Mayall – a born and bred Oldhamer. Having a development partner for this major scheme allows the council to draw on the highest levels of knowledge and expertise.

The partnership could last for up to 25 years and will mean that brownfield (previously developed sites), in the town centre are built on rather than green space.



A new park for our town centre

Oldham's town centre is undergoing a remarkable transformation with the creation of a **new linear park**. This ambitious project is fuelled by the redevelopment of Spindles Town Square Shopping Centre and the relocation of Tommyfield Market. By freeing up previously developed land, Oldham aims to breathe new life into the heart of the town.

The **5.7-acre park** will be a vibrant hub for the community, offering a place to **exercise**, **play**, **and connect**. Whether it's a morning jog, a family picnic, or a friendly gathering with colleagues, this green space will provide a refreshing escape in the midst of urban life. Oldham's vision is to create an inviting oasis where residents and visitors can enjoy the outdoors, fostering well-being and community spirit.




Multiple growth opportunities

Upgrades to the TransPennine route and Greenfield Station, coupled with housing developments, plus a vision for integrated development and improved amenities, signal future growth and prosperity.




South – Failsworth, Hollinwood and Medlock Vale

Ideally placed close to Manchester and the M60, the area has witnessed economic shifts but retains its rich heritage, thanks to its past as an industrial hub.


A 10% population increase over the last 10 years signals significant growth and development potential, especially for businesses.




Connectivity is key


Better transport links benefit Oldhamers and in the long term this will help support the development of new homes, jobs and businesses whilst opening up the rest of Greater Manchester to our residents.




People


Oldham is a borough with an infrastructure which supports growth and connectivity to:
