South Pennine Moors Special Area of Conservation (SAC) / Special Protection Areas (SPA) Supplementary Planning Document - SEA Determination Statement

September 2024

1. Strategic Environmental Assessment Introduction

- 1.1. Oldham Council, Rochdale Council and Tameside Council are jointly preparing a South Pennine Moors SAC/SPA Joint Supplementary Planning Document (SPD). The three authorities are the "responsible body" for the purposes of this SEA "screening" report.
- 1.2. This statement sets out the determination of the need for a Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) in accordance with Regulation 9 (3) of the Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes Regulations 2004 and European Directive 2001/42/EC for the South Pennine Moors SAC/ SPA Joint SPD currently being prepared.

2. Strategic Environmental Assessment Context

- 2.1. The requirement for a SEA is set out in the Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes Regulations 2004 (the Regulations), which implements the requirements of the European Directive 2001/42/EC.
- 2.2. The SEA Directive (2001/42/EC) identifies the purpose of SEA as "to provide for a high level of protection of the environment and to contribute to the integration of environmental considerations into the preparation and adoption of plans and programmes with a view to promoting sustainable development". It requires the determination as to whether the plan or programme under assessment is likely to have significant environmental effects, taking account of the criteria set out in Schedule 1 of the Regulations. The Regulations require that the results of this process are set out in a Screening Determination Statement (this document), which must be publicly available.
- 2.3. Before making a formal determination in relation to SEA, there is a requirement to consult the three statutory consultation bodies designated in the Regulations (the Environment Agency, Historic England, and Natural England) on whether environmental assessment is required, which was

- undertaken and their responses to the consultation are at Appendix 2 of this statement.
- 2.4. The Planning Practice Guidance (Paragraph: 008 Reference ID: 11-008-20140306) states that: "Supplementary Planning Documents do not require a Sustainability Appraisal but may in exceptional circumstances require a Strategic Environmental Assessment if they are likely to have significant environmental effects that have not already been assessed during the preparation of the relevant strategic policies".

3. The South Pennines Moors SAC/SPAs Supplementary Planning Document

- 3.1. The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) defines SPDs as documents which add further detail to the policies in the Development Plan. As SPDs do not have the same status as policies contained within the Development Plan, they are not subject to independent examination.
- 3.2. The Places for Everyone Plan (PfE) was adopted by, Bolton, Bury, Manchester, Oldham, Rochdale, Salford, Tameside, Trafford and Wigan (the nine PfE authorities) and took effect on 21 March 2024. The aim of the SPD is to provide further guidance on how criterion 7 of Policy JP-G5 of the PfE will be implemented, which seeks to ensure new development does not have an adverse impact on the protected habitats and species on the South Pennine Moors.
- 3.3. The PfE Plan is the "parent DPD", which has already been subject to Sustainability Appraisal incorporating SEA.
- 3.4. The importance of the South Pennine Moors is reflected in a range of international, national and local habitat designations. It supports important breeding bird populations and is classified as a Special Area of Conservation (SAC) and two Special Protection Areas (SPA).
- 3.5. The SPD relates to the:

- South Pennine Moors SAC;
- Peak District Moors SPA; and
- South Pennine Moors Phase 2 SPA.
- 3.6. The SAC and SPAs are European designated habitat sites which overlap each other. When referring to all three designations together, this SPD refers to the South Pennine Moors SAC/SPAs.
- 3.7. The SPD is applicable to the local authority areas of Oldham (not including the area covered by the Peak District National Park), Rochdale and Tameside.

4. Screening Determination

- 4.1. Regulation 9 (2) requires that the responsible authorities consider the criteria specified in Schedule 1 before making a determination on whether the SPD is likely to have significant environmental effects. Appendix 1 of this statement contains the detailed consideration against the specified criteria.
- 4.2. Oldham Council, Rochdale Council and Tameside Council consider that after having regard to the Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes Regulations 2004 the South Pennine Moors SPD does not require a Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA).
- 4.3. The responsible authorities have come to this view for the following reasons.
- 4.4. The SPD sits beneath a hierarchy of plans which provide a policy framework for the location, nature and scale of growth and link to retained EU law. These plans have been scrutinised through the SEA process and any required mitigation is already identified.
- 4.5. The SPD's purpose is to ensure new development does not have an adverse impact on the protected habitats and species on the South Pennine Moors SAC/SPA.

4.6. The SPD provides guidance on PfE Policy JP-G5 'Uplands', it does not set new policy. Policy JP-G5 has been informed by the outcome and recommendations of the Habitats Regulations Assessment and Sustainability Appraisal for the PfE plan.

5. Consultation with the statutory bodies

- 5.1. Having prepared an initial screening determination statement, the responsible authorities consulted the Environment Agency, Historic England and Natural England, in accordance with the Environmental Assessment of Plans and Programmes Regulations 2004. On behalf of the responsible authorities, the documents were, at the same time, also made available on the GMCA's website. The purpose of this consultation was to establish whether organisations agreed with the outcome of the initial screening.
- 5.2. Each of the statutory bodies have confirmed that they agree with the responsible authorities' conclusion that the proposed South Pennine Moors SAC/SPAs SPD would not require a full Strategic Environmental Assessment or a Habitats Regulations Assessment.
- 5.3. The relevant correspondence is attached at Appendix 2.

6. Conclusion

6.1. Given the outcome of this assessment and the response of the statutory consultees, provided at Appendix 2, the responsible authorities have concluded that a full Strategic Environmental Assessment is not required for the South Pennine Moors SAC/SPAs SPD.
