Reason for decision

The purpose of this report is to consider the introduction of 'No Waiting at Any Time' restrictions on parts of Sholver Lane and Wilkes Street, Oldham.

Recommendation(s)

Support the introduction of 'No Waiting at Any Time' restrictions on parts of Sholver Lane and Wilkes Street, Oldham.

Background

Sholver Lane, Oldham, is one of three main accesses into the residential area of Sholver. As well as residential traffic, the route is also used by commuting traffic wishing to connect between the Heyside and Moorside areas of the Borough.

The Sholver area comprises of a mix of newer properties, which have off street parking provision and older properties which do not; the residents of the older properties have to rely on designated parking areas or the highway for parking. There are a small group of older properties located at the junction of Sholver Lane and Wilkes Street, which are some distance from a designated parking area. Consequently, the residents have been utilising a length of Sholver Lane directly outside their properties for parking, but also utilising the footway to the detriment of pedestrians.

The length of Sholver Lane where the parking is taking place is where pedestrians must cross to access Wilkes Street; when approaching from the footpath links provided along the Village Green area. Due to the level of traffic using both Sholver Lane and Wilkes Street, it is essential that pedestrians have clear visibility of approaching traffic when crossing at this location.

The Traffic Team has recently received complaints regarding the parking taking place along Sholver Lane, due to the safety problems that are resulting for pedestrians. It is reported that

the vehicles are repeatedly being parked, near to or on the crossing point, which causes issues for pedestrians with prams or in wheelchairs and reduces the ability to see approaching traffic.

The parking problems have been observed and it is recommended that prohibition of waiting restrictions be introduced as detailed on drawing number 47/A4/1727/1

Alternative option(s) to be considered

Option 1: To approve the recommendation.

Option 2: Not to approve the recommendation and allow the obstructive parking to continue.

Consultation

The Ward Members have been consulted and no comments have been received.

G.M.P. View - The Chief Constable has been consulted and has no objection to this proposal.

T.f.G.M. View - The Director General has been consulted and thank you for consulting Transport for Greater Manchester with your proposals, while I am not aware of there being a specific issue with buses being unable to get past parked vehicles at this location, and the parking restrictions are proposed to make the situation better for pedestrians, these measures if installed will also enable buses to continue to pass this location unimpeded. On behalf of TfGM's bus team I fully support these proposals.

N.W. Ambulance Service View - The County Ambulance Officer has been consulted and has no comment on this proposal.
